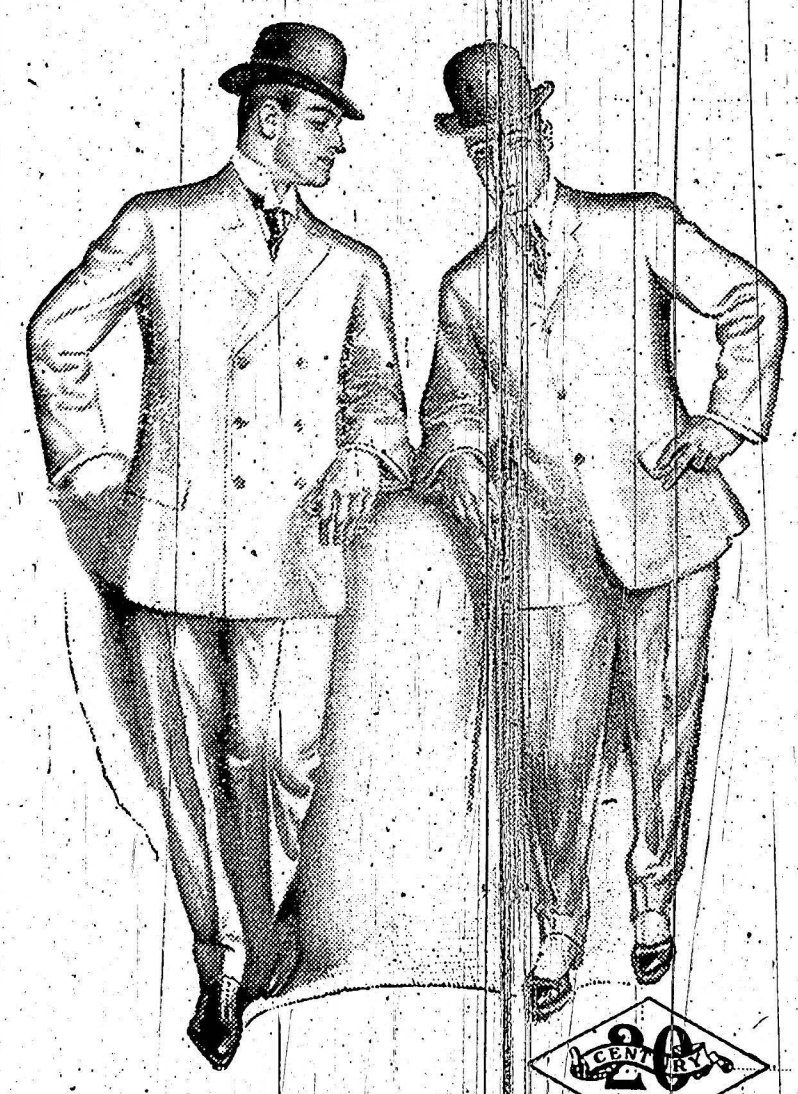

Miss Alice Speck, of Bantroy, spent her Easter vacation with Mrs. A. Ferris.

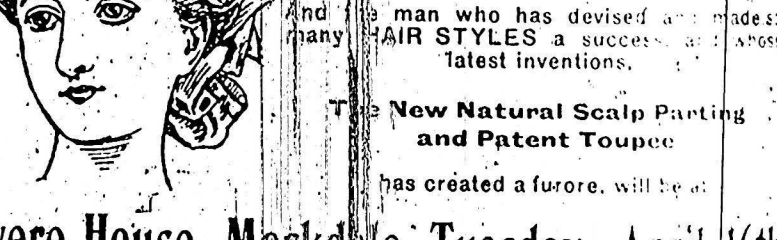
