Death of Mrs. Geo. Snider.

One of Owen Sound's eldest citizens and earliest settlers passed away on Wednesday, May 1, when Mrs. George Snider died at her home on Terrace street. Mrs. Snider, whose maiden name was Jane Maughan, was in her 83rd year, having been born in 1815 at Holt Whistle, Northumberland, England. When quite young she came with her parents to Canada, settling in Scarborough, near Toronto. Both parents died shortly after, within a few weeks of each other. In 1835 she was married to George Snider, and came to Owen Sound with him in 1853, when Grey was erected into a county, of which Mr. Snider was the first sheriff, and which he afterwards represented in the House of Commons. He died in June, 1885. Mrs. Snider had no children, but adopted and reared the four orphan children of her brother, John Maughan. They are: Mrs. James Sutherland, New York; Mrs. W. McCansland, Regina; John Groton, New York; and Joseph, Sault Ste. Marie, Ont. Mrs. John Armstrong, wife of the Crown Attorney, is also a niece, the daughter of the late Sheriff Maughan. Mrs. Snider adopted her at her father's death, and since the death of the late Mr. Snider they have lived together. Miss Jane Maughan is also a niece. Mrs. Snider was known to a large circle of friends, to whom she had endeared herself by her quiet, happy disposition. She was a member of the Methodist church. The funeral took place on Friday to Greenwood cemetery.—O. S. Sun.
