**Artemesia Council.**

Artemesia township council met on Saturday last. The members were all present, the reeve in the chair. Minutes of last session were read and confirmed. Communications as follows were presented: From Neil McKinnon and 49 others, asking that the statute labor in the police village of Pricerville be commuted at 75c per day; report of assessors on assessment of the police village of Pricerville; report of reeve re road at lot 24, con. 12; report of committee re Pricerville statute labor and agreement between the council and price trustees; report of Court of Revision on drainage by-law No. 1; tenders for concrete arch bridge from various parties. By-law 688 to commute statute labor in the village of Pricerville was introduced and read a first, second and third time, also by-law 679, appointing municipal officers for 1907.

**Carson—Meads**—That the account of J. & W. Boyd for supplies for town hall, \$4.46, be paid.—Carried.

**McKenzie—Meads**—That Jno Wright be paid his account of \$4.00 for taking vote of sidewalk by-law, and the same be charged to the account of the village of Flesherston.—Carried.

**Meads—Carson**—That the reeve's account for telephone messages, 50c., be paid.—Carried.

**McKenzie—McLoughry**—That the account of the Contract Record for advertising bridge tenders, \$4.60, be paid.—Carried.

**Meads—McKenzie**—That the account of W. H. Thurston for advertising for bridge tenders, \$3.60, be paid.—Carried.

**Meads—Carson**—That Mr. Thurston's account of \$55 for advertising drainage by-law No. 1, Proton Station, be paid and the same be charged to the drainage account.—Carried.

**McKenzie—McLoughry**—That the report of committee appointed to confer with the police trustees of Pricerville be paid and the committee be paid \$2.00 each for their services.—Carried.

**McKenzie—McLoughry**—That the clerk advertise the closing of those parts of Simpson street in the town of Pricerville lying between reserves Nos. 1 and 2 and 2 and 4 and a by-law be passed at the proper time for such purpose.—Carried.

**McKenzie—McLoughry**—That Mr. Carson and Mr. Meads be authorized to confer with all parties having fences or other obstructions on certain streets in Pricerville as complained of by Mr. McCabe, and to take such action as they may deem wise with the object of having obstructions removed.—Carried.

**McLoughry—Carson**—That the reeve and treasurer prepare a statement of all moneys received from Leslie Elliott on behalf of the late Robert Smith, and after deducting all expenses incurred the balance be forwarded to Mr. Harness, manager of the County House of Refuge.—Carried.

**McKenzie—Carson**—That a special grant of \$100 be made and expended in and near Eugenia, the amount to be expended under the supervision of commissioner of division 4.—Carried.

**Meads—Carson**—That one hundred dollars be granted and expended on 30 sideroad north from Durham road to connect baseline to Caylon, the commissioner of ward 11 to meet the said amount with \$50 of his ward appropriation and expend the whole.—Carried.

**McLoughry—McKenzie**—That \$165 be granted to be expended by the reeve on valley road south from Andrew Graham's.—Carried.

**McKenzie—McLoughry**—That the draft agreement presented between the council and the police trustees of the village of Pricerville be adopted and executed by the reeve and clerk, and the corporate seal attached thereto.—Carried.

**McKenzie—Meads**—That this council accept the tender of Messrs. Walker Bros. to build Boyne bridge according to plans and specifications, for the sum of \$1400, the work to be completed on or before July 1, 1907.—Carried.

**McLoughry—Carson**—That the reeve is hereby appointed to meet C. P. railway official re ditch at Caylon.—Carried.

**McKenzie—McLoughry**—That the first sitting of the Court of Revision on assessment roll of 1907 be held in the township hall on Saturday, the 1st June, 1907.—Carried.

**SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTHWEST HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS.**

ANY even numbered Section of Dominion A Lands in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta, excepting 8 and 20, not reserved, may be homesteaded by any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section of 160 acres more or less.

Entry must be made personally at the local land office for the district in which the land is situated.

The homesteader is required to perform the following conditions:

(1) At least six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year for three years.

(2) If the father (or mother, if the father is deceased) of the homesteader resides upon a farm in the vicinity of the land entered for, the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by such person residing with the father or mother.

(3) If the settler has his permanent residence upon farming land owned by him in the vicinity of his homestead, the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by residence upon the said land.

Six months' notice in writing should be given the Commissioner of Dominion Lands at Ottawa of intention to apply for patent.
