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House of Refuge Notes (By an inmate.) I think, Mr. Editor, that since last writing from here four or five deaths have occurred at the Home, the last one being that of Ann Graham, aged 76, who crossed the bar about noon on Thursday last, the 28th inst., which is the sixth during the past two months. The deceased was a spinster, she was admitted about two years ago from the Owen Sound district, where, it is said, she had relatives in celebrated good circumstances, but whom however she did not seem to recognize her. Although perhaps a little weak minded, and while in the asylum fairly good health up to the last three days of her life, when she was seized with a cough, which, although having no serious appearances, was no doubt the cause of her death, the rupture of a blood vessel being supposed to have taken place. The Manager notified her friends of her death, asking them if they intended to take charge of the remains. Receiving a negative reply, she received the same burial as the other less fortunate inmates. The Rev. Mr. Robinson, pastor of Christ Church, Markdale, read the impressive English Church burial service over the remains in the sepulchral room in the afternoon, the assembled inmates on Friday morning, after which undertaker Chapman conveyed them to their last resting place. Andrew Lennox took his departure from the Home on the 21st inst., his time having expired. Andy is a most remarkable strong, active man for one of 80 years, and he thinks he can make out for himself for a while longer. If he can do so by his labor his case is all the more remarkable, as he has no home of his own or relative to rely on, or him, we are very much inclined to think that his days of self dependence are past and he will realize that this is a cold world for the aged, friendless and homeless man. We wish to assist him to seek the shelter of the House of Refuge. He buried his wife a short time previous to being admitted. Robert Ashin, of Markdale, also left on the morning of the 24th. His leg is not yet well, he is quite lame yet but he thinks the warm weather will make it all right. We hope so. Bob is a first rate fellow and we trust he will be able to get along alright. A couple more anticipated leaving during the present week, even your cor. is seriously thinking of rusticiating somewhere during the summer. Harry Harness, of Owen Sound, and part of the staff here, vacated the Manager and Mattson on the 24th of the day he devoted to trout fishing with a fair catch. He was accompanied from Owen Sound by his cousin, Miss Lena Dunnington, late member of the Home staff. Miss Dunnington is a (Monday) Harry left by the noon train on Saturday. Mrs. Holley commenced her duties on the staff here on Monday last in the place of Mrs. Carson, recently vacated through ill health. The inmates were deprived the privilege of an outing on the 24th, the privilege having been abused by some last year. Your cor., however, spent a most enjoyable afternoon as the guest of Mr. and Mrs. W. N. Haskett, of Markdale. Mrs. Clinton and Mrs. Robert Rutledge, of Fiesherston, called on your scribe on Thursday last. He is not personally acquainted with the former, but the latter is an old and estimable acquaintance and neighbor, whom he has known almost from her childhood. Mr. George Moorhouse, jr., of Toronto, accompanied by his uncle, Mr. J. Lever, of Ardenburg, called on your scribe on the 24th. Since last we met, time has transformed little Georgie into a strapping fine young man, unrecognized at first sight by your cor. As the editor of this paper would rather not make announcements of Sunday visitors, our young friend from Stone's Settlement will kindly excuse us for omitting to mention him. William Scott, of Osprey, aged 17, was admitted to the Home on the 24th inst. We understand that he is the one of the Dr. Barusido batch brought to this country two years ago. Shortly after his arrival he obtained a berth as watchman on one of the freight steamers plying between Owen Sound and Port Arthur and where he experienced severe weather which resulted in an attack of inflammatory rheumatism, accompanied by fever.
