CORNER STONE Laid OF ST. JAMES' CHURCH.

Thursday, June 27th, will be long remembered by the people of Markdale as an eventful day, as it was coupled with the corner stone laying of St. James' Church, Fourth Line. The event is very successful and most interesting; they have been marked the success that can only be achieved by persistent work, perseverance and good judgment; secondly, in presenting to note that the present-day proceedings provide for the people of Euphrasia to provide for the carrying out of the good work in connection with the various churches of our parish.

St. James' Church replaces the old frame structure that was erected in 1867. It is to be 55 feet by 32 feet, and will provide ample accommodation for the large number of people who take part in divine worship at this place.

The day was an ideal one and the ceremony was witnessed by about 400 people from every part of the township. Many were present from Meaford, Thornbury, Clarksburg, Heathcote and Markdale. One very pleasing feature of the proceedings was the presence of three members who attended the first and last services held in the old church. The first service was held in the old building on September 15th, 1867, and was attended by Mr. G. Lindsay and Mrs. S. Fisher, Griefsville, and Mr. E. Snelgrove, brother of the late Dr. Snelgrove, of Meaford. The parties were, as above stated, connected with this church from its earliest history.

The present rector, D. E. Cameron, and his able assistant, Mr. H. Millar, have worked faithfully and are to be congratulated on the success of their efforts. They have been in charge of this parish since July 1st, 1906, relying Rev. Mr. Appleyard, who is now carrying on good work at Clarksburg.

Rev. Mr. Cameron opened the ceremony, and reviewed briefly the work that is being accomplished by the congregation, after which he read the history of the old church from the time of its erection up to the present. The ceremony of laying the corner stone was then performed by Mr. I. B. Lucas, M.L.A. of Markdale. After the customary articles had been deposited in the cavity of the stone, Mr. Lucas took the trowel and mortar and pronounced the stone to be well and truly laid. The other speakers were Rev. Mr. Appleyard, Clarksburg, and Rev. T. H. Brown, Meaford.

On being called upon Mr. Lucas thanked the rector and the congregation for the honor conferred upon him in asking him to take part in the ceremony. He appreciated being associated with the excellent work of erecting a new church. He hoped the new edifice would be ornamental and a credit to its members and congregation. He had listened to the historical facts about the old church with much interest and attention and was pleased to see that the old church was not present at the opening of the new one. A church was privileged to see the erection of the new church. Other workers were gone from human sight. He expected the congregation would meet with difficulties, as it had done in the past, but was pleased with the record made by the congregation. He would sooner have his name enrolled with the erection of a new church than have the best mountain in Canada obtained. The erection of the old church carried them back, he said, to the early days of our country, of which the nation is justly proud. Noting the prosperity of the country, he was pleased to know that the erection of new churches would make this country greater in the future. Low churches were the corner stones of this country, as it has been said. There was a more important side of life. While our country was teeming with material and mining development, he was pleased to say that the church and school education were going forward that added materially to the nation's greatness. He had met people who were dissatisfied with preachers—these people had gone to the States to see politicians and lawyers put in jail. He pointed out that the success of the church enterprise depended greatly on the support it received, financially and otherwise. It is to be regretted that pressing himself confident that this church would be blessed with the generosity and liberality of its people.

Rev. Mr. Appleyard, of Clarksburg, was the next speaker. He was always aware that any property invested in need of a new church, and congratulated the rector and members on the success of their undertaking. He was enthusiastic in saying that the fourth line was one of the best lines in Euphrasia. This church, he said, had a host of good helpers, the old members taking a lively interest in the enterprise. The late Mr. George Vickers was the first name to be entered on the list of contributors. Mr. Jas. Loughdave gave great encouragement for the building of a new church. Mr. Appleyard used God's church for baptism and weddings at these ordinations were the work for the spiritual church.

Rev. T. H. Brown, of Meaford, was pleased to be present at this eventful service. He was not ashamed to be identified with the church that had never been forsaken by patriots. He hoped this church would be abundantly blessed. He thought that as the world advanced that the church of God would advance also. He assured the people that there was no better legacy left for themselves or families than the erection of this new church. After the singing of some appropriate hymns the speeches were brought to a close.

Next on the programme was a football match between Minniehill and Fairmount the latter winning by a score of 1-0. Refreshments were then served in the church sheds, whereby the A.Y.P.A. took in about \$132. After tea Beverdale and Fairmount kicked ball with the result that Fairmount again won by a score of 8-0.

The literary programme was excellent and the ladies in charge deserve unlimited praise for the way it was carried out.

A collection was then taken up when \$25 was raised toward the church fund.

The Markdale Citizen's Band was present and discoursed music throughout the afternoon and evening.
