CORNER STONE LAID OF ST. JAMES' CHURCH.

Thursday, June 13th, will be long remembered by the people of Euphrasia as an eventful day, as it was rasia as an eventrul day, as it was conpled with the corner stone laying of St. James' Church. Fourth Line. St. James' Church replaces the old frame structure that was erected in 1867. It is to be 55 feet by 32 feet, and will provide ample accommodation for the large number of people who take part in divine worship at this place.
