PROTON STATION

The All-powerful Hand of the Angel of Death again made itself felt in this vicinity on Tuesday of last week when Mr. Jacob Searle was taken over to the side of the great majority. Mr. Searle had been ailing for some time, and, although his death was not unexpected, nevertheless it was rather sudden, as he had been feeling some better that evening.

July, 1829, in Devonshire, about fifteen miles from Plymouth. He was the son of a Devonshire laborer and suffered severely with thousands of others because of the Crimean War. In 1856 he emigrated to Canada, having been informed that hard times were unknown in this country. Upon his arrival in Canada he found that conditions were not out of bright or had ditions were not quite as bright as had been pictured, and after being em-ployed for two years wilh the late Mr. Walton, of Peterborough, he moved to the north of Ontario, settling at Bruce Mines in 1859. While residing at Bruce Mines Mr. Searle experienced two of the most important and most blessed experiences of his life. It was while here that he met Mrs. Searle (then Miss Lebetha Knight) and through her influence and under the spiritual guidance of the Rev. John Hutcheson he professed himself a follower of the Lord Jesus Christ and was one of his most faithful followers up to the hour of his departure from

At Sault Ste. Marie, in 1862, he was married to Miss Knight, and six years later, deciding to take up farming, he Holland, Grey County, and took up a farm a short distance from Berkeley, and while dwelling here Mr. Searle united with the Baptist Church.

About thirty-five years ago, at the time of the construction of the narrow gauge railway, Mr. and Mrs. Searle made another change of residence, moving onto a farm near Bethel. While at Bethel he took an active part in the work of the Baptist church and upon its removal he united with the Bethel Methodist Church, of which he was a member at the time of his death. As usual, Mr. Searle took an active part in his Master's work and was for a ong time one of the S. S. teachers and a leader of the choir.

In October, 1905, Mr. and Mrs. Searle made their third and last change in this life, when, owing to Mr. Searle's ill health, they moved into the village of Proton. For nearly a year before his death Mr. Searle was confined to the house and practically unable to do anything for himself, suffering from palsey, which finally affected his heart and carried him away.

The funeral, which was held on Thursday afternoon, was very largely attended. The service was conducted by Rev. Ferguson, of Dundalk, who delivered a short address at the house and preached the funeral sermon based on John 14: 7-10, before a large congregation at Bethel church upon the arrival there of the funeral. After the preaching of the sermon the remains of the deceased were laid in their last resting place, the pall bearers being Messrs. A. Colgan, A. Sherson, D. McMillan G. Blakely, E. Rutherford and W. Ludlow.

Mr. Searle leaves behind him to mourn his demise, his wife, who is also well up in years; two nephews, George and Fred Boardman of Winni-

Mr. Searle will be greatly missed, Baines led the singing. ose closely related to him but by all who knew him for his fine christian spirit and example made him beloved by all. Though he suf-fered very severely he never com-plained, for he knew that the Master who sent him the suffering would also give him the necessary strength with which to bear it.
