UNIQUE CEREMONY AT VANDELEUR.

Monument to the Pioneers Unveiled on Dominion Day—An Immense Gathering.
Every day increases the prospect for a monster gathering in Markdale on the 12th July. A special train is to leave Owen Sound at 8.30. Round trip 1.00. Owen Sound 8.37 75c. Chesley 9.03 75c. Holland Centre 9.10 35c. Berkeley 9.20 25c. Arriving in Markdale at 9.30, and returning will leave Markdale at 6.30. Another special train will leave Orberston at 10.30. Round trip 75c. Dundalk 10.40 60c. Protton 10.50 40c. Flesherston 11.00 25c. Arriving at Markdale at 11.15, and returning will leave Markdale at 4.48. Large preparations are being made to accommodate the people, not only by the village of Vandeleur, but by others. For instance, the Presbyterians will serve hot meals in Ennis' warerooms, Main street; the Methodists people in the basement of the new church and also furnish hay and oats for horses in their immense cement barn, which will accommodate over one hundred horses. Mrs. Leslie will serve dinner in Jackson & Haugh's implement warerooms, and doubtless there will be others which we know not of. A procession is to march at 1 o'clock to Riverside Park where addresses by prominent speakers will be delivered. Prizes are to be awarded for best uniformed lodge, largest lodge and the lodge coming the greatest distance, and a lacrosse match is to be played on King Edward Park; also a concert in Marsh hall at night. The charge for meals is to be uniform, the popular old time 25 cents, and everybody who will conduct themselves properly is invited. Markdale Citizens Band will be in attendance all day.
On a corner of the school lot the monument in commemoration of the pioneers was unveiled on Monday. It is about nine feet in height, round in shape and is a splendid specimen of Scotch granite. On the sides it bears the names of the old settlers, and on that side facing the road is chiseled "1857-1907. To the founders of S. S. No. 13, Artemesia, whose courage, honest intention and habits of purpose converted the primeval forest into homes for themselves and those that came after them. Erected by their descendants." While at the base is cut in large letters the one word "PIONEERS".
Of the pioneers whose names are inscribed on the shaft only three remain: J. Holley, R. Smith and Mrs. Caldwell Carson. Death of Mrs. Milsap.

After a steady decline of physical strength for several months, Mrs. Mary Ann Milsap passed peacefully to her reward on Sunday last, June 30, 1907, at her home, 235 Horse street, Toronto. Deceased was of a gentle, retiring disposition, and a fine type of christian character. Some eighteen months ago her youngest daughter, Nellie, died in Minot, N. Dak., and the stroke was more than her frail physique could bear, and ever since her vitality gradually waned until dissolution as above. A very touching and appropriate service was conducted Monday evening at the home, 34 Morse street, Toronto, by the Rev. W. Frizzle, of Owen Sound. The body was brought by her son Samuel on Tuesday to Markdale, and interment took place this Wednesday in the family plot in the public cemetery, to which the remains of her late husband and daughter Eliza are to be removed forthwith.
