GREY COUNTY COUNCIL.

THURSDAY.

When the council resumed business Thursday afternoon, June 20, the clerk read in addition to numerous accounts, statements from the South Grey Farmers' Institute and the Women's Institute and the county treasurer, asking to have his salary increased to \$1,500; reports from inspectors N. W. Campbell, S. Huff and H. H. Burgess.

Mr. Preston submitted report number three of the finance committee, which was adopted. It recommended that the county clerk receive an increase in salary of \$200; that a grant of \$80 be made to the Women's and Children's Prison and social work of the Salvation Army; that \$100 be given to the general and marine hospital on condition that they receive inmates of the House of Refuge; \$10 each to the North, South and Centre Grey Women's Institutes; \$25 each to the North, South and Centre Grey Farmers' Institutes; \$200 each to the regularly organized agricultural societies of North, South and Centre Grey on the basis of distribution as last year; that no grant be made to the Central Society at Walters Falls. A number of accounts were also passed and ordered to be paid.

Report number three of the road and bridge committee was presented by Mr. Goldsmith and considered in committee. It recommended in addition to passing several accounts, that the bridge over the Pottawatamie between Owen Sound and Brooke be repaired at once. The report was adopted.

Mr. Hall read report number two from the education committee, recommending the appointment of arbitrators to consider the formation of a union school section between Artemesia and Owen Sound. It was decided that a satisfactory bond is given by all parties interested for payment of all costs. The following were named as arbitrators: Messrs. Thomas Scott, McIntyre, J. W. Burgess, Flesherston; and R. J. Ball, Hanover, by-law No. 707 confirming the above appointments was introduced and read a first time.

On motion, Mr. A. Muir was instructed to pay over to the county treasurer \$15, proceeds of the sale of old bridge between Glenelg and Artemesia.

By-law No. 708 to guarantee the debentures of the town of Meaford to the Georgian Bay Milling and Power Company was introduced and read a first time.

By-laws Nos. 707 and 708 were read a second time and the council adjourned to meet at 2 o'clock on Friday afternoon.

FRIDAY.

On resuming business Friday afternoon the clerk presented a further list of accounts which were duly passed on to their proper departments.

Mr. Preston read report number four of the finance committee, which was adopted after some slight amendment in committee. The report dwelt with the equalization of the assessment of the different municipalities which was recommended in the following: Artemesia; \$1,621,213; Bentloch, \$1,885,225; Collingwood, \$1,730,045; Derby, \$1,292,000; Egrement, \$2,000,000; Ephrasia, \$1,690,650; Glenelg, \$932,708; Holland, \$1,300,000; Inverness, \$2,300,000; Normandy, \$2,575,569; Osvey, \$1,553,355; Proton, \$1,845,500; Sarawak, \$471,904; St. Vincent, \$1,731,875; Sullivan, \$2,013,525; Sydenham, \$2,134,325; town of Owen Sound, \$2,500,000; Dunham, \$450,000; Sawyer, \$450,000; Meaford, \$700,000; Thornbury, \$200,000; Castworth, \$125,000; Dundalk, \$200,000; Neustadt, \$95,000; Markdale, \$215,000; making a grand total of \$32,027,437.

SAURDAY.

When the council took their places Saturday morning Mr. Preston submitted report number five of the finance committee, recommending that the treasurer receive an increase of \$100 per annum in salary and that the report of the South Grey Farmers' Institute and the Women's Institutes be filed; also that an account of W. J. Bellamy be paid. The fifth report of the road and bridge committee was also adopted, recommending for payment several accounts, \$300 on contract for iron bridge at Privocille to Messrs. Jencks & Dresser.

Mr. Agnew submitted a report from the committee on memorials ordering the presentation of the grand juries at the February sittings and June sessions to be printed in the minutes and expressing regret that they could not pay the railway fares of jurors visiting the House of Refuge.

On motion of Messrs. James Leslie and James Erskine, the reeve and second and third deputy reeves of the Owen Sound were added to the road and bridge committee in connection with the building of the Pottawatamie bridge.

On motion the clerk was instructed to make arrangements with Mr. Campbell, deputy minister of public works, to have him address the council relative to government roads to county roads at some time during the November session.

A vote of thanks was tendered the council of Owen Sound for the use of the town hall during their visit to Markdale.

Council adjourned to meet at 7 o'clock p.m.
