Oratory at the Orange Gathering on Friday Last.—A Verbatim Report of Mr. McFarland's Address.

The heavy downpour of rain during the procession to Riverside Park on July 12th prevented hundreds from attending and hearing the addresses which were delivered during the afternoon.

At the request of many who were unable to be present we give below a full report of the splendid address delivered by our popular former townsmen, Capt. G. F. McFarland, B.A., LL.B., Mr. McFarland, who is a son of W. J. Mr. Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen:

Birds of all I want to thank the Loyal Orange Lodge No. 1045 most heartily for the honor which you have done me in inviting me to say a few words to you to-day. I appreciate it more than I can tell, because this is my home and because I feel that you are all my friends. I congratulate you on the magnificent celebration which is taking place, and the country was safe for another year.

Now, ladies and gentlemen, it is my intention to impose upon you by making a long speech.

It is my intention, if you will permit me, to discuss with you some of the general aspects of our Canadian national life as they present themselves to-day. I feel that no gathering more representative of the type of Canadian citizenship could be found than this, and it never does any harm either to the nation or to the individual to devote a few minutes to introspection, and I shall
