Artemesia Township Council.

Artemesia Township Council met in the town hall, Flesheron, on Saturday last. The members were all present. The Reeve in the chair. Minutes of June session were read and confirmed. The following communications were read: From the Secretary of Ontario Municipal Association re meeting of the same; W. Wilcock regarding exchange of old road allowance for deviation on lot 30, 1 N.D.R.; A. McCabe, objecting to closing of Artemesia street, Priceville; R. Allen, re 180 sidroad.

Bylaws 684, 685, 686, 687 and 688, to close up and dispose of parts of Harvey street, Artemesia street, Queen street and Town Line Street, in the village of Priceville, were introduced and read a first time. After considerable discussion these bylaws were laid over for further consideration.

Carson-McLoughry-That the following accounts for gravel used by overseers July certified be paid: A. McDonald \$2.15, W. H. Patterson \$4, George Clark \$4.50, Peter Muir \$6.75, James Oliver \$8.15, George White \$8, Frank Taylor \$1.75, G. Williamson \$3; Mrs. Jamieson \$2.25.-Carried.

Meads-Carson-That J. A. Heard be paid as follows: One roofer plow \$25, and one road planer \$50, total \$75.-Carried.

Meads-McLoughry-That Walker Bros. be paid \$300 on account of bridge contract.-Carried.

Carson-Meads-That Walker Bros. be paid \$12, contract price for straightening stream at Boyne Water bridge.-Carried.

McKenzie-McLoughry-That Mr. Meads be refunded 75c paid by him for wrench and repairs to grader.-Carried.

McKenzie-Meads-That Mr. McLoughry be paid \$10 for five days superintending work with grader.-Carried.

McLoughry-McKenzie-That \$75 be expended on town line Artemesia and Glenlogie at lots 105, 106, Toronto line, to meet a like amount to be expended by Glenlogie, and the Commissioner by Div. 2 expend the same.-Carried.

Meads-McLoughry-That \$75 be granted and expended by Mr. McKenzie on Campbell's deviation.-Carried.

Carson-McLoughry-That in regard to request of Mr. Richard Allen, relative to 30 sidroad; the clerk notify him that this council is prepared to carry out the resolution passed in 1904 regarding said road.-Carried.

Meads-McKenzie-That the Reeve and Clerk be a committee to wait on Mr. Wm. Wilcock in regard to a settlement for lands purchased from him for deviation around the lake in lieu of 30 sidroad N.D.R. and deeds be drawn up and executed.-Carried.

McKenzie-Meads-That W. A. Armstrong be permitted to cut down and remove shade trees opposite lots 1 and 2, Toronto street, Flesheron.

McKenzie-McLoughry-That the time in which Messrs. Walker Bros. was to have had the Boyne Bridge completed having expired, the time be extended to Aug. 1, 1907, but nothing in this resolution shall affect or alter the terms of the agreement save as to time, or in any way relieve said contractors from the due completion of said contract according to plans and specifications.-Carried.

Meads-Carson-That this council arrange to meet the Glenlogie Council at Priceville at 9 o'clock p.m. on the 30th July to discuss the matter of closing part of town line as asked for by solicitors O.C.E.R.-Carried.

McKenzie-Meads-That Harmon Radley is hereby appointed pound keeper in the room and stead of D. McTavish, resigned.-Carried.
