CAPT. MCFARLAND'S BRIGHT SPEECH.
(Continued from page 1.)

house, has this task been given, and it behooves us to take thought lest we be found faithless to the trust.

It will be apparent to even the most casual observer that the prime necessity for the development of this country is POPULATION. The total population of Canada at the last census was less than five and one-half millions, while the total area of the country is nearly four million square miles. In other words, the proportion of population to the square mile is only 1.5. That of the United States is 21, and of England 558. This country can support a population of 100 millions, and I firmly believe that it will have it in 2000 A. D. During the past six years 710,000 immigrants have found homes within our borders, and this is just the beginning. We need this vast influx of people to develop the natural resources of our country and to make Canada the great nation that she is destined to become.

But we need something more than mere numbers. We must bear in mind that these strangers that are flocking to Canada, and their descendants, are going to be the Canadian citizens of tomorrow. Is it not fitting, therefore, that they should be most carefully scrutinized, and that we take steps to prevent Canada being made the dumping ground for the scoundrels of Europe? We must see to it that the immigrants who come to this country are capable of being assimilated with our own population; that they are capable of imbuing the ideas of political, civil and religious liberty which are the basis of our commonwealth; that they are capable of living up to the principles of liberty, fraternity and equality upon which our constitution is founded. In short we must see to it that they are capable of performing the duties of citizenship without abusing its privileges. We are bound to confess that at the present time there seems to be a tendency in official circles to hurry the foreigners into the country, regardless of their suitability or unsuitability. In the Donkaboos we have a grand example of the transplanting of a people radically different in religion, customs and ideas to the remainder of the population, inferior mentally and carrying on their shoulders the burden of centuries of oppression. Now, from a philanthropic standpoint, that may have been an excellent move, but from a utilitarian point of view it seems extremely unwise. These people seem absolutely incapable of becoming assimilated or of imbuing our Canadian ideas, and the result is that we have on our hands a little Russian menagerie presented to the nation by Hon. Clifford Sifton, the inmates of which consider it their duty to go trekking over the country every little while in the costume in which they were born, and have to be rounded up by the mounted police. These are not the sort of people who are going to help us build up a strong and distinctive nationality.

Then every day or two we read in the papers how some English magistrate has discharged a criminal from custody on condition that he will emigrate to Canada. Its all very well to talk about giving these unfortunate people a chance to begin life over again in a new country. A few of them may possibly do so, but I fancy you will find that the great majority simply continue their careers of crime, until one of them horrifies the whole country by a fiendish deed such as the assault on that young woman near Montreal the other day. Let me give you another little piece of information. Of 54 male patients admitted to the Toronto asylum for the insane during the six months just passed, 37 were foreign-born, and the majority of them recent arrivals. Do you realize what that means? It means that you are putting your hands into your pockets and paying out money to support lunatics who have been admitted to this country for the purpose of becoming citizens. Do you not think that it is high time that the methods of the Dominion Immigration Department were altered, and that the officials in charge of immigration were informed, in no uncertain terms, that the people we want in this country are the healthy, sober, industrious and intelligent class, and that we can produce all the criminals and lunatics that we want of our own? And in view of the disclosures which were made during the last session, before the investigation was stifled, I think the Canadian people have a right to demand that the men whom we have constituted the wardens of our gates shall cease to occupy their time in cooking up grafts with the steamship companies and shall realize that to them is entrusted the task of selecting the future citizens of Canada.

But once the immigrant has passed within our borders, the duty is shifted from the Immigration Department to you and me. Upon our shoulders, as citizens of this country, is cast the responsibility of educating these people up to the highest ideals of Canadian citizenship; and by succeeding generations shall our work be judged. We must teach them the sacredness of private rights and property; we must teach them the inestimable advantage of the franchise, and the duties which it entails; we must instil into them respect for the law of the land, and religious toleration. In short we must, so train them that they will prove themselves worthy of the great and glorious heritage which they are to
