Gleng Council Minutes.

The council met July 13th, pursuant to adjournment. All the members present, the Reeve in the chair. Minutes of last meeting read and confirmed. Several communications, gravel and other accounts were read. Messrs. Doherty and Armstrong, the engineers of the Walkerton and Lucknow Railway Company, waited on the council and produced plans and profiles showing the route of the road along the second concession south, and the new road now being built in lieu thereof, explaining at the same time that the present location of the new road was the only one now possible for them to give.

Weir—McMillan—That gravel accounts be paid as follows: Alexander McEachern, \$4 35; Thos. Long, 3 55; W. H. Patterson, 3 55; Joseph Atkinson, 6 70; James Ledingham, 2 75; James Wilson, 2 40; William Weir, 5 00; Thomas Thompson, 5 00; Malcolm Black, 3 00; William Nelson, 4 00; John Gray, 3 20; Donald McArthur, 4 50.

McMillan—Weir—That Geo. Patterson be paid \$2.75, being half cost building culvert at lot 25, township 6, N. & A. Carried.

Weir—Hunt—That accounts for repairs of grader be paid as follows: Hamilton Allan, sharpening blades, \$2.50; James Hastie, repairs, 50 cents; Kelly and Hunsley, repairs, 65 cents. Total \$3.65.—Carried.

Weir—Hunt—That this council instruct the clerk to inform the council of Holland that we are agreeable to settle with William John Bell provided he will settle for a reasonable sum, and that the Council of Holland appoint a time and place to meet and arrange a settlement with Mr. Bell.—Carried.

Hunt—Weir—That a cheque issued in favour of I. B. Lucas for \$25.00 to pay for deviation across Herb Ewart's farm, being half cost of procuring clear title to that deviation.—Carried.

Hunt—McMillan—That the Reeve be paid \$2.00 for committee work on Ewart's deviation.—Carried.

Weir—McMillan—That this council agrees to have a joint meeting with the Council of Ardenesia at Priceville at 4 p. m. on Saturday, the 29th July, re the closing of a portion of the township between Gleng and Ardenesia, and that the clerk notify the clerk of Ardenesia to that effect.—Carried.

Weir—Hunt—That this council approves of the Walkerton and Lucknow routes through the Township of Gleng, as shown to us on plans and profiles this 13th day of July, 1907, and that the Reeve and clerk are hereby instructed to sign their names on such plans in approval thereof.—Carried.

Black—Hunt—That the Reeve, Mr. Weir and J. A. McMillan be a committee to inspect the new road now being constructed by the Walkerton and Lucknow Railway Company and report at next meeting of council.—Carried.

Further cheques were issued as follows: Thos. Davis, lumber and work on bridge lot 6, cont. 7, \$29.00; William Boyte, filling washout lot 6, cont. 12, \$2.00. Council adjourned to August 14th at 7 p. m. J. S. Black, Clerk.
