If completo statistics were accessible there can be little doubt they would show that the annual loss of life and property is far greater than is commonly supposed. In one respect the damage is often greater than it need be, even apart from any consideration of lightning conductors. During five or six days in the summer of 1884 it was estimated by a competent inthority that besides other mischiel no less, than six hundred animals of one by lightning, most of them being sheep and cattle in the field. In all such cas-nalities it is usual to regard the carcases as unfit for human food, says the London Chronicle, and they are ordinarily buried. 


