At three o'clock on Thursday morning last, the spirit of Mrs. Thomas Kells passed away. About eleven o'clock the previous evening she was seized with a paralytic stroke, and this, together with a weak constitution, which had been gradually declining for some years, hastened the end. Her death was without suffering and she passed peacefully away. The deceased lady's maiden name was Marianne Glasford. She was born at Niagara Falls, N. Y., in 1838, and when very young moved with her parents to Toronto and later to Albion township. Here, in 1864, she was married to Mr. Thomas Kells, after which they first in Artemesia township until four years ago, when they moved to town and bought a residence on Main street. Mrs. Kells died only eighteen months ago. Mrs. Kells was a devoted Christian lady, and her neighbors readily testify to her many acts of kindness and thoughtfulness. She was a member of the Anglican church. One sister, Mrs. Jas. Henry, in town, and six brothers survive; John and six brothers, and Richard at Toronto. One son and six daughters are also left to mourn, viz: W. G. Kells, Carstairs, Alta.; Mrs. W. J. McCallum, at Edmonton; Mrs. A. W. Sheldon, Maple Creek; Mrs. (Rev.) P. C. Cameron, Owen Sound; Mrs. A. S. Henry, Mission City, B. C.; Mrs. A. E. Myles, Kimberley, and Miss Edna, at home. The funeral, which took place on Saturday, was largely attended, and was conducted by Rev. Mr. Robinson, rector of Christ Church, assisted by Rev. P. C. Cameron, of Owen Sound. The pallbearers were Thos. Glasford, Caldon East; P. Munshaw, Engestrin; Mr. John McGea, Vanderkay; Mr. W. J. Christie, Oakville; Mr. James McMillan, Ceylon, and Mr. Richard Smith, Markdale.
