The adjoining buildings were saved by strenuous efforts of the fire brigade. Wood & Son's loss on building, machinery and lumber will be about \$2,000; insurance \$1,000.

After weeks of hot and dry weather here were treated to a most refreshing shower on Friday last which allayed the impalpable dust to which all spectators were most welcome; but it did more than that. The over-towering importance of the shower was in its relation to the crops, which were suffering from the continued drought, and the crying need for the replenishment of the wells and water reservoirs of all kinds on the farms. The domestic animals are a vital element in the life of Ontario. So far this has been a bad season for them. On farms where they are numerous the watering and feeding of them has become a slight problem. Friday's shower was only a slight alleviation of the difficulty. Several days downpour would scarcely spare it, but it may be hoped that timely showers occurring frequently may in some measure ease the strain that is being felt. The forest fires which have been raging in the vicinity of Markdale were becoming a menace, and only by almost superhuman efforts on the part of the neighbors have buildings been saved from destruction. The downpour of rain put a damper on these fires. Friday's shower was a blessing in many ways.

Markdale Furniture Company Elects Officers.—Important Meeting on Monday Night.

A meeting of the shareholders of the Markdale Furniture Company for the purpose of general conference and organization was held in the council chamber on Monday evening.
