Blended Flour.

Only by wisely adopting new discoveries can the farmers of this Province compete on even terms with the West, whose specialty is wheat. Western flour has invaded Ontario, and the decline in the demand for Ontario wheat is to-day a fact only too evident to farmers. After the Cement Mills.

Claiming that at least three cement mills in Ontario are operating on Sunday, contrary to the provisions of the recent Lord's Day Act, Rev. T. Albert Moore, official of the Lord's Day Alliance called upon Hon. Mr. Foy, Attorney General, at the Parliament buildings yesterday. The three mills in question are at Durham, Shallow Lake and Lakefield. At present the only workings of a cement mill which can be legally operated on Sunday are the rotary furnaces, which would burn out if left idle for a day. All other work, however, must cease according to the new act. "Their action is only typical of most of the other mills of the Province, notable exceptions being the Sun, the Grey and Bruce and the Imperial all of Owen Sound," said Rev. Mr. Shearer after the conference. "Action against mills in other parts of the country will also be taken."
