Defeated in Orangeville on Saturday by Toronto Junction.

The Markdale lacrosse players can now hang up their sticks and take a long rest. On Saturday last their chances for the championship were spoiled, when they were defeated by the Toronto Junction team on Idylwyld Park, Orangeville, by the score of 8 to 4. It takes a mighty good team to win every day, and the boys have every reason to be proud of their first attempt in the Junior C.L.A. Two semi-final games in five days is more than ought to be asked of any team. After defeating Guelph in a hard fought struggle on Tuesday the Ju Aberdeens were ordered by the C.L.A. to play Toronto Junction on Saturday. The boys had hardly recovered from the previous game and were not in fit shape for the gruelling contest on Saturday. However, they were game and hung on till the bitter end. In the first stages of the game,

before the strain began to tell, Mark dale had a decided advantage. The first goal went to the Aberdeens, Joe Kelly carrying the ball from centre and scoring in twenty seconds. Brother Mike repeated in four minutes. The quarter ended three all; Burnside scoring for Markdale just before the whistle blew. Both teams were playing a fast, steady game. The Junction defence received orders to "cover up that Markdale home." This they did, in fact so closely that the Aberdeen's scoring end was simply tied up when the ball came flown. The Junction team began roughing it and the work of referee Dobbin, of Peterboro, was rotten. He allowed the city chaps to cross check, trip and slash and refused to penalize them. Harvey Lucas and Wilfred Burnside were both knocked down, but the offenders were let go and the Markdate players warned that "if they laid down again he would rule them off." Elmer Tuck got ten minutes for tripping, yet not two minutes after, Carman King was deliberately struck in the face with a Junction stick, breaking one tooth, without the offender being penalized. It was, without doubt the worst deal that was ever handed out to a Markdale team by any referee, and even the Orangeville spectators were disgusted. To cap the whole affair, the Toronto Junction goal-keeper threatened to quit the game if his team did not cut. out their rough work. With three Markdale players "doing time" on the penalty bench the Junctionites were able to score twice. leaving the score
