In the Fall display of Ladies Work excelled former years. Grain, Fruit, Roots and Vegetables were also ahead of former years.

Some disappointment was felt at the non-appearance of Mr. Wilson, the Superintendent of Fairs, who was advertised to be present to open the Exhibition.
