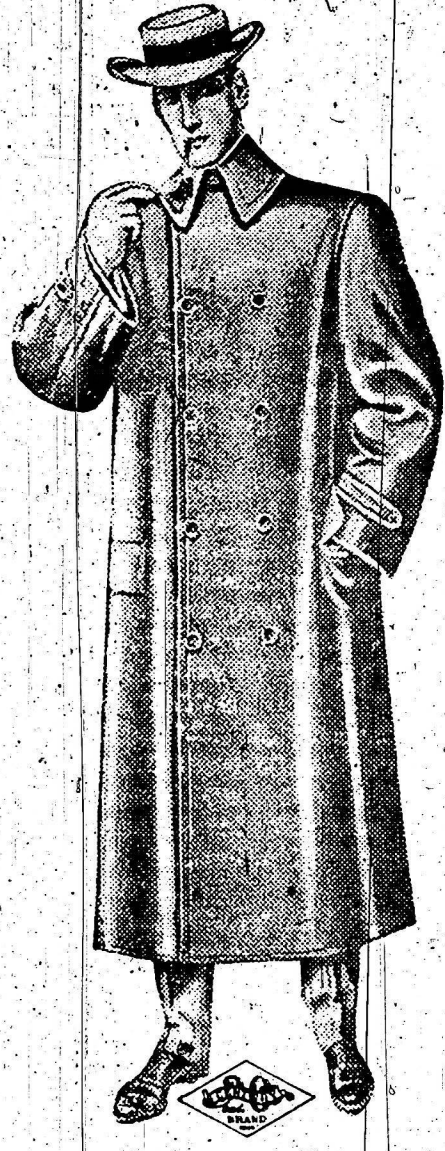

House of Refuge.

Dr. Bruce Smith, provincial inspector of hospitals, prisons and houses of refuge, continued his investigation here last week re the conditions alleged to exist at Grey County house of Refuge. His findings, as also those of the House of Refuge Committee, who had just thoroughly scrutinized the situation, were so entirely out of harmony with the recent notorious Grand Jury presentment, that he deemed it proper to notify the foreman and other members of the said Grand Jury to meet him in Markdale so that he might ascertain the grounds upon which said presentment had been based, but the foreman refused to attend, and only one member of said Grand Jury put in an appearance, and he frankly confessed, after more thoroughly investigating the matter, that the Grand Jury's presentment might be greatly modified. We hoped to be in a position this week to give the Inspector's report, but it is not yet to hand. The House of Refuge Committee's report will not be public property until the County Council have first pronounced upon it, but we understand that the only change which they recommend in the bill of fare is that the inmates get sugar in their tea.

McCutcheon and John Shute be sent to the clerk of the peace of the County of Grey for County constables.—Carried. Campbell—McFarland—That the Clerk be instructed to send a copy of proposed cemetery by-law to the Municipal World, asking as to legality of same.—Carried.

Mr. Rodger, of Orillia, accepted a call to the Knox Church, Owen Sound, and was preparing to move to this town. MINISTER GOES TO U. S.

Rev. W. T. Allison Takes Church and Course Across Border. Stayner, Oct. 30.—A farewell banquet was tendered to Rev. W. T. Allison and Mrs. Allison in the Presbyterian church Monday evening. Rev. Mr. Allison has been pastor here for exactly five years, his ordination and induction having taken place on October 28, 1902. The members of his congregation at Stayner and Sunnidale assembled in full force to give him and his wife a hearty and affectionate farewell. He was presented with a gold-headed cane and a purse of gold. Mr. Allison has accepted a call from a church in Middlefield, Conn., with the privilege of pursuing post-graduate study in English literature in Yale University, where he obtained his B. D. degree in 1907. He is recognized as one of the most scholarly of the younger men in the Presbyterian ministry, and his career will be followed with deep interest by his friends here.
