Markdale Nominations

Probably the most representative gathering of ratepayers ever assembled at a nomination meeting about \$20,000, which spread over a period of thirty years would amount to about \$1,200 a year, or here was that of Monday evening, an increase in the tax rate of two last, when the following slate was nominated:

For Reeve—Messrs. J. H. Stephenson and Albert Jackson.

For Councillors—Messrs. L. G. Wilson and J. G. Matthews (all last year's council.)

For School Trustees—Messrs. J. W. Ford Jr., Rev. A. Shepherd and W. J. Howard.

Mr. Jackson has since retired from the contest, so that Markdale's council for 1908, and the age Committee, of which he was chairman.

At the conclusion of the hour set apart for receiving nominations, Mr. J. E. Treloar, was voted to the chair, and a couple of hours were interestingly spent discussing what had been accomplished during the past year, and the prospects of the future.

Mr. J. H. Stephenson was first called upon to give a lengthy address. He said the year 1907 had been a year of preparation. An appropriation of \$100 had been made for this purpose during the year. His speech on Monday night was a revelation to the ratepayers. In his capacity as chairman of this important committee, he had endeavored to extend all his best energies. He had visited Shelburne and Toronto when the Hydro Electric power was discussed by Adam Beck, and had secured a great deal of information about same, but this power was found to be almost out of the question owing to the great expense. He had also looked into the question of securing a water cart for the town last summer, but found that one could not be operated with success unless we had a system of waterworks, owing to the difficulty in securing water. He did not concur with a previous speaker's remarks that the proposed cement industry at Bell's Lake was a wildcat proposition. As a member of the council he intended to investigate the matter thoroughly, and if there was going to be any benefit to the town to have same located at Bell's Lake, he was going to do all in his power to help along the industry. He was in hearty sympathy with the waterworks proposition, especially owing to the great need of a system of fire protection. He hoped the citizens of Markdale would look at this matter in the proper light, and secure adequate protection from fire before it was too late.

In his opening remarks Councilor Wilson expressed himself by saying that although he was chairman of the Road and Bridge Committee, which was the "whole job," he had endeavored to look after the town's interests to the best of his ability, and would do so in the future. He thought the purchase of a road grader would be a good investment for the town. He thought it was high time for the town to act in the matter of fire protection and believed the proposed system about met our requirements. Councillor Matthews and School Trustees Rev. Shepherd and J. W. Ford, Jr., followed in short, pointed addresses.

Dr. Sproule was the next speaker, and said that as he was not an aspirant for office, he could do little but find fault, and a critic was not always the most popular. He confessed he could not see the wisdom in putting the new sidewalks in the middle of the road, which, he said, was an improvement (?) which he had not seen in any other part of the world. However, it was done now and could

not be helped. He was not in hearty accord with the million-dollar good roads scheme which the County was now considering, and which Mr. Stephenson touched on in his address. He did not believe so much money should be spent on roads which owing to the high rail fences were impassable one-third of the year. He thought municipalities should use their authority to enforce owners of fences to remove same when their presence was the cause of blocking the highways with snow for four months in the year.

We could have better roads without this large expenditure of money if councils would exercise their power.
