

ARTEMESIA.
The Artemesia municipal elections on Monday resulted as follows: Deputy-Reeve, T. R. McKenzie, 287; W. J. Meads, 269; majority for McKenzie, 118. Councillors—Alex. Carson, 354; Geo. Wright, 370; Robert Best, 335; H. D. McLoughry, 198; Arthur Johnston, 144. The first three elected. Mr. McKenzie was moved up from the position of Councillor to Deputy-Reeve. Mr. Meads last year. Messrs. Carson and Best are ex-councillors and Mr. Wright is a new man taking the place of Mr. McLoughry. Mr. A. Blair, Reeve, was returned by acclamation.

OWEN SOUND.
The municipal contest in Owen Sound was fiercely fought out on local option lines. Local option being in force, the anti-fight to have a representation on the Council that would submit a repeal vote in 1909. The result was the defeat of local option candidates. The following is the list of municipal officials for 1908: Mayor, Matthew Kennedy; Reeve, F. W. Harrison; First Deputy Reeve, H. Lemon; Second Deputy Reeve, Dr. Lang; Third Deputy Reeve, Jno. Legate; Councillors, J. M. Davis, E. Lemon, A. Thomson, G. W. Garnett, Wm. Taylor, U. Christie, H. B. Harrison, Dr. Mershey.

POWER BY-LAW.
The power by-laws voted on in Western Ontario municipalities on Monday in connection with the project of the Hydro-Electric Commission were carried in every case with the exception of Ingersoll. In many cities the majority in favor was overwhelming, as Hamilton, London, St. Thomas and Stratford. The proposal which was defeated in Ingersoll provided for the expenditure of \$50,000 for the purchase of the local Light Company's plant.

In Durham the bridge-by-law was carried by 178 majority. Hesperateratepayers passed a by-law to raise \$12,000 for the extension of a pipe line for fire protection. Meaford decided to have a new town hall, to cost \$15,000 and to grant Seaman, Kent & Co. a \$18,000 bonus.




