About the only business transacted was the appointment of Jas. S. Rowe and Jas. E. Matson as auditors for the coming year. The first regular meeting of council will be held on Monday, Jan. 27.

### FIFTY-ONE YEARS A RESIDENT OF EUPHRASIA

Death of James Clugston, of Epping, in his 79th Year.

Euphrasia Township lost another of its best known and most highly respected residents on Sunday last, January 12th, when Mr. James Clugston, near Epping, passed away to his reward. Mr. Clugston was one of the very earliest settlers of the Township. He was born in Armagh, Ireland, in 1830, and was therefore in his 79th year at the time of his decease. In 1844 he emigrated to Canada with his parents, and resided for some time near Brampton. Fifty-one years ago he moved to Euphrasia township, where he has since resided. In 1858 he married Miss Anne Knott, who has proven a worthy partner, and a devoted mother. Preparations were being made for celebrating their Golden Wedding on January 29th. Mr. and Mrs. Clugston were blessed with a family of ten, six sons and four daughters, all of whom survive, viz: Isaac and Ewart in B.C. Fraser, of Knox College, Harold, teaching at Keady, Elijah and Milton, at home; Mrs. J. D. McArthur, Euphrasia; Mrs. W. S. Abercrombie, Collingwood; Mrs. James Smyth, Keady; Miss Louise, at home. Mr. Clugston was a man of industrious habits, charitable and kind to all, and a man whose word was as good as gold. He was a Conservative in politics, and in religion, a Presbyterian. The funeral took place to Temple Hill Cemetery, the obsequies being conducted by Rev. W. M. Goudin, in the absence of Rev. Dr. McLaren, of whose church he was one of the earliest members. Friends and neighbors sympathize with the family in their bereavement.

### CONSERVATIVES RE-ELECT PRESIDENT

Mr. T. H. Dyre, of Thornbury, Again the Choice of the East and Centre Grey Conservatives.

One of the largest and most enthusiastic meetings in the history of the East and Centre Grey Conservative Association was held in Haskett's Hall, Markdale, on Friday last. At two o'clock the hall was filled to the doors with stalwarts of the party, with Mr. T. H. Dyre, of Thornbury, President of the Association, in the chair.

The election of officers resulted as follows: President—T. H. Dyre, Thornbury. Vice President—Dr. L. G. Campbell. Treasurer—W. J. Shortill. Auditor—John Lyons. Secretary—Walter Turner.

Vice Presidents for the different municipalities were elected as follows: Euphrasia, W. R. Perry; Osprey, Dr. Bond; Holland, A. Gillespie; Artemesia, H. D. McLoughry; Collingwood, George Badger; Thornbury, M. Snetinger; Dundalk, S. Bell; Markdale, Oswald Walker; Sullivan, Jas. A. Thompson; Chatsworth, Wm. Breese; Proton, Jas. H. Corbett.

Addresses were delivered by Dr. Campbell, Joseph Ferguson, H. D. McLoughry, M. Snetinger, Dr. A. Ego, S. J. McKnight, Jr., James Erskine, I. B. Lucas, M.P.P., and Dr. Sproule, M.P. The speakers confined their remarks chiefly to the discussion of the cleanliness of administration under Hon. J. P. Whitney's leadership, and the straightforward methods which had been brought into use in dealing with provincial matters under his regime.

A resolution to that effect, and also one endorsing the platform of the Opposition at Ottawa were unanimously adopted.

A resolution was moved by Dr. Campbell favoring the election of municipal councils for two years, instead of one, as at present. Discussion followed, and the general sentiment appeared favorable to the resolution.

After assuring the present number, Mr. I. B. Lucas, of the undivided support of the Conservatives of the province, and complimenting him on his efficient work in the House, the meeting was brought to a close.

### Pew Renting.

After giving the free pew system a trial for a year the Methodist congregation were asked to cast a ballot for the method preferred, which vote resulted in 60 per cent favoring rented pews, so the trustees have decided to offer certain sections of the church for rental, and applications will be received by Mr. J. E. Trelford, the pew steward, up to Saturday, Jan. 18, for sittings for 1908. The prices range from 50 cents to \$2.00 per sitting. Plan and tariff may be seen at Mr. Trelford's hardware store.

### Went Through Ice.

William Lee, of Pike Bay, Drowned at Collingwood.

Collingwood, Jan. 13.—William Lee, son of H. G. Lee, of Pike Bay, aged about 17, with some others, were skating on the inner harbor, close to Charlton's sawmills, when getting on some treacherous ice he went through. Norman Best was saved from a like fate by Joe Smith. When Wm. Lee fell through, Norman Best, who was skating farther up the shore, securing some rope from one of the boats nearby, advanced to the rescue of the lad, but the ice failed him. He made some daring attempts to save the boy's life, and was himself pulled out by the assistance of the rope he had. His face was badly cut by the ice. The body of Wm. Lee was recovered. Until recently Lee has been in the employ of the Collingwood Packing Company.
