TO REJECT 3-5 CLAUSE

For Local Option in West—Manitoba Government will Revert to Simple Majority?

The Manitoba Provincial Government's liquor license bill just distributed proposes some radical changes in the law. Of these the most important is one which the Liberals urged strongly during the last election campaign, and which formed part of their platform. A majority, instead of a three-fifths vote, will hereafter if the bill be passed, be sufficient to carry a local option bylaw, and in case of the repeal of such a bylaw two years are required to elapse before it can be re-submitted.
