DEATH OF MRS. NEIL.

Another old resident and one very highly respected in the community passed away this (Monday) morning in the person of Mrs. Martha Neil, relict of the late Mr. Wm. Neil, whose death occurred a year ago. On Wednesday morning of last week Mrs. Neil was seized with a paralytic stroke from which she gradually sank until the end peacefully came. The funeral will take place to the public cemetery on Wednesday afternoon, when service will be conducted in the Presbyterian church. The deceased, who was 67 years of age, was born in Daplington Township, County of Durham, where 27 years ago she was married to her late husband, with whom soon after marriage she came to Artesia and settled on a new farm on the west back line. Prosperity attended the labours of the esteemed couple and 27 years ago they retired from the farm and settled in a very comfortable home in this place. Mrs. Neil was an amiable woman, possessing a generous and kind heart. Many ministers of the gospel and others, lodged and found a "warm welcome" in her home. Her Christian life was most consistent and her deep interest in religious things led her into useful and faithful service in the various organizations of the church to which she belonged. Chalmers Church, of which she has been a member since its organization, over 30 years ago, has suffered much by her removal. Mrs. John Stewart, niece of the deceased, but who filled the place of daughter in her affections, has the sympathy of many friends in her bereavement.
