## MODERN DEMOCRACY.

Democracy is becoming more democratic. It is only when we contrast the present with a generation ago that we realize the change, and see where we are going. Whether it is for the better or worse remains to be seen. In the past the electors did not insist upon an absolute conformity to their opinions, as the condition of the member of Parliament retaining his seat. It seems reasonable that the representatives in the House of Commons or the Legislature should have some freedom of action. He cannot be expected to commit himself absolutely to any rigid policy expressed at nomination or on the stump. It is in the very nature of things to come to some kind of working agreement with his fellows. Something must be left to personal initiative and integrity of character. The growing tendency today is Constituency Government, as against Parliamentary Government. The Government is becoming more sensitive to the will of the people. In the United States the President is chosen by a popular vote. Senators in a number of States are similarly elected. Another instrument for giving the people more power is the Referendum. Still another device for transferring power to the man in the street is the Direct Primary, where the voter goes to the poll to nominate his representative. This corrected an abuse and seems to work well. It gives the people a tight grip on their representative and by means of this they can call him sharply to account, sometimes more effectively at the nominations than the elections. At the elections the party vote would carry an unpopular candidate through, but at the nominations they deal directly with the fitness or unfitness of the candidate. In addition to this and possibly one of the prime causes of this change is the publicity given to parliamentary affairs. The people never knew so much or demanded to know so much of what is going on. This is the inevitable growth of democracy, which, according to the old adage, is "like the grave—it takes and never gives." The Government of the country and the policy of the Government, and the makers of the policy are the people. Formerly the few ruled, and only showed condescension or deference to the constituency on the eve of an election. Now the rulers are representatives of the people, directly carrying out their wishes and that alone. Demos has awakened, let us educate him, and preach the gospel of the responsibilities of citizenship, or democracy will become a blind force, working not for good but for evil.
