**W.C.T.U. COLUMN**  
**A WORLD-WIDE REVIVAL.**  
 (By Mrs. May R. Thornley.)  
 Is it possible, we may have part in  
 securing it?  
 Can we make sure of an awakening  
 in even our own town or city?  
 Can we compass so much as the sal-  
 vation of our relatives?  
 There is a key to these three rooms  
 (which open one into another) and it  
 is within reach of every child of God.  
 Its name is Prayer. The astounding  
 thing about this Key is not that it will  
 throw wide to us the doors of God's  
 Treasure House, but that we use it so  
 infrequently and to obtain such trifling  
 good.  
 Let us each ask ourselves—What is  
 the burden of my supplications? Is it  
 that this or that sickness or financial  
 loss, shall be averted? That my own  
 besetments shall be conquered? Do I  
 spend a good share of each interview  
 with the Lord, in bewailing my failures  
 and hardness of heart?  
 Well, and are not these proper sub-  
 jects to bring to the All-Father?  
 They surely are. He has even com-  
 manded us to tell Him all about them,  
 for we are to be "anxious for nothing,"  
 we are to carry "everything" to Him  
 through prayer. (Phil. 4: 6) But sup-  
 pose we use up our prayer seasons and  
 the best of our spiritual energy in  
 presenting these topics, while in our  
 very own home, or our family circle,  
 there are souls in hourly danger of  
 eternal banishment from God. Are we  
 not like the woman who carried from  
 her burning building her new dress  
 and spring bonnet and left behind her  
 money and valuables? Suppose the baby's  
 and one more little innocent should be  
 added to the great throng of baby  
 souls, that are growing into sinless  
 beauty in the very presence of the  
 King; would that compare for one  
 second to the horror of a Christian's  
 grave for the son or daughter just step-  
 ping out into the world's allurements?  
 For the husband who is interested only  
 in the concerns of time? For the  
 sister or brother who is still putting  
 off the day of decision? There are  
 thousands of women in Canada who  
 would count it a privilege to exchange  
 their daily load of misery for the  
 memory of a little two-by-four grave.  
 Death is not the enemy most to be  
 dreaded; neither is poverty.  
 Let us put the baby into the hands  
 of the Great Physician, Who bade us  
 bring the little ones to Him—and hav-  
 ing fully committed the case, refuse  
 to worry. We have, then, at our dis-  
 posal a skill, in comparison with which  
 that of the combined medical profes-  
 sion is foolishness.  
 Let us tell the "Judge of the Earth"  
 of the injustices we are made to suffer  
 by the selfish throng, who, in their de-  
 sire to get wealth have shoved us to  
 the wall. But having thus unburdened  
 our heart, let us put these cankered  
 thoughts from us. They are His con-  
 cern now and He never forgets to  
 right His servants.  
 And let us bring that besetment of  
 ours, and our indifference to the souls  
 about us, and the lack of heart-int-  
 erest in the Word. Those are indeed  
 subjects for prayer, for has he not  
 said, "If our heart condemn us not,  
 then have we confidence toward God.  
 And whatsoever we ask we receive of  
 Him." (1 John 3: 20, 22.)  
 Having definitely spread these soul  
 ailments before the one and only Soul-  
 Physician, who has not a right to arise  
 up, with our feet upon His promise,  
 "This is the confidence that we have  
 in Him, that if we ask anything ac-  
 cording to His will, He heareth us:  
 And if we know that He hear us, what-  
 soever we ask, we know that we have  
 the petitions that we desired of Him."  
 (1 John 5: 14, 15.)—and say, "The work  
 is in progress. Each day will see some  
 of it accomplished. Now I may count  
 myself at leisure to run upon the  
 King's errands."  
 Then let us take the Prayer-Key and  
 put it into the lock behind which lies  
 that soul for which we know we are  
 the most responsible.  
 (And because it is so much easier  
 (and far more than twice effective)  
 to pray in agreement with another,  
 than to pray alone, let us look about  
 for a Prayer-Mate, an "Incessory  
 Colleague," as our English friends put  
 it. This may be husband, or sister or  
 neighbor. But if there is no one whose  
 heart leaps out joyously at the thought  
 of proving with us, Christ's limitless  
 promise, "If two of you shall agree on  
 earth as touching anything that they  
 shall ask, it shall be done for them of  
 My Father, which is in heaven." (Matt  
 18: 19.)—then we would only be ham-  
 pered by their presence.  
 We never do pray alone anyway. "He  
 ever liveth to make intercession for us.  
 So when we shut ourselves away from  
 the family, and kneeling before the  
 opened Bible, look up into the face of  
 our Father, there is a Prayer-Mate by  
 our side who joins His voice—that  
 never pleads in vain—to ours.  
 How long do you think that son or  
 daughter or husband will hold out  
 against the tremendous pressure our  
 prayers must lay upon them? They  
 may go about their daily tasks, or  
 pleasures, with just as much apparent  
 zest; but every hour God is working  
 building barriers between them and  
 sin; breaking down prejudices and  
 planning a new burning and some day  
 the fires that are now burning out of sight,  
 will eat their way through the crusts  
 of pride and indifference and faith will  
 be lost in sight.  
 Yes, we will begin with our very  
 own; but (if only for their sakes, and  
 our soul's sake) we will not limit our  
 supplications to them. Day after day,  
 in private and family prayer, we will  
 storm the Throne of Grace for a revival  
 in our town. And we cannot long  
 pray that prayer without finding op-  
 portunities to help, bring it to pass.  
 To these three questions that open  
 this article let us answer.  
 "Yes, by the Grace of God, we can."
