Camp 6, Waldie Bros., near Blind River reports the shooting of 3 wolves first week in March.

Streetsville village is getting quite metropolitan having bought a horse, price \$100, weight 1,300 pounds.

The G. T. R. pension goes to Michael Cane, of Newmarket, who began railroading on the World Northern 54 years ago.

Warton Echo notes that a thunderstorm as early as March 13 is not altogether phenomenal, but is not usual.

Blind River is now the home of a new lodge A. F. & A. M., warranted under the name of "Pneubonking Lodge."

Shelburne Free Press says that pure and almost refined kerosene has been pumped from the hotel well at Reddickville.

Rev. J. W. Totten, of Bradford, cannot recall the equal of the present winter for snow in his many years of preaching.

A company of six or seven families, all from near Mount Forest, leaves this week to settle in Lake Valley district, Sask.

The steamer Premier, capacity 550 passengers, will make daily trips on the Saint Ste. Marie-Thessalon route next summer.

\$42,000 SHORT IN HIS ACCOUNTS.

DOUGLAS FINDLAY ARRESTED NEAR TOTENHAM—SAID HE WAS ENGAGED TO FORMER OWEN SOUND YOUNG LADY.

Douglas B. Findlay, 21 years of age, was arrested on Wednesday night of last week in Athlone, near Totenham, Simcoe county, on a charge of misappropriating funds amounting to \$42,000 from the firm of McDonald & Mabee, cattle dealer, of Toronto, by whom he was employed as clerk.

Mr. McDonald, a member of the firm, said he first became suspicious of Findlay when he appeared at the office wearing a \$300 watch. When questioned about such an expenditure of his salary, Findlay said he was engaged to a wealthy young woman, Miss Maude Trethewey, youngest daughter of Captain John Trethewey, formerly of Owen Sound.

Findlay is known to have paid attentions to Miss Trethewey, but their engagement is denied. He is said to have supplied her with flowers of the most expensive kind, paying \$15 a dozen for roses and \$10 a bunch for violets. He is also alleged to have given her three diamond rings. Miss Trethewey is well known in Owen Sound, and also in Markdale, having visited here on several occasions. The family lived in Owen Sound until a little over a year ago, when they moved to Toronto. She is popular and highly esteemed and a great deal of sympathy is expressed for her in her present rather embarrassing position.

Findlay's operations extended over a period of less than one year, and the holes in which he operated is shown by the fact that over \$15,000 was taken in actual cash coming into the office of the firm.

Upon learning that he was being watched, Findlay fled to Texas, taking with him a guarantee bond on himself for \$10,000. Later he was seen in Chicago, and still later he turned up in Toronto and registered at the Rossin House as J. Van Norman of Australia. Findlay spent part of his money and posed as a financial merchant. He passed among friends. Recently he has been spending his time in York County.

Things came to a climax when Mr. McDonald swore out a warrant for his arrest, and Detective Mackey started for Totenham, Ont., to arrest him. Mackey had instructions to cross the contingent if necessary and was at the Union depot awaiting his train, when word came from Athlone that he had been arrested there.

Passing of the Small Mill.

Thus the passing of the old mill works against the farmer's true interests.
