Mr. and Mrs. Geo. Bretz, of Toronto, spent Sunday and Monday with their parents in this town.

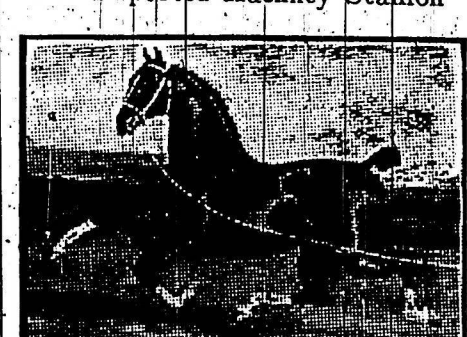
