

FARM DRAINAGE DEMONSTRATIONS

O. A. C. Is Willing to Give Assistance in Drainage.

The Department of Physics at the Ontario Agricultural College desires to announce the continuance of its previous offer of assistance to farmers in matters pertaining to drainage. For the past three years we have been authorized by the Minister of Agriculture to get out and assist any farmers in taking the levels of his lands for drainage purposes, in planning the most advantageous system of drains, and in calculating the grades and sizes of tile for the different drains. A finished map, bearing all the information is sent to the owner. This serves two purposes: First, it is used as a guide in constructing the drains; second, it may be preserved as a record of the exact location of every drain, so that if for any reason it should be necessary in years to come to find any drain it could be done accurately at a moment's notice.

The number of applications for assistance has increased very rapidly, so that last year we had many more than we could attend to. To enable us to meet this increased demand the Minister of

Agriculture has this year given us a special appropriation whereby we have been enabled to double our staff for this work.

A new feature is being added: We have found in the past that frequently the neighbors in the vicinity of the farm being surveyed were interested and wished to observe the operations. This suggested the desirability of making these demonstrations public, and this will be done wherever possible. Anyone interested will be welcome on all occasions. By this means we shall be able to instruct a much larger number in matters pertaining to drainage problems.

Anyone wishing drainage surveying done should apply to Wm. H. Day, Department of Physics, O.A.C., Guelph. The only outlay connected with the work is the travelling expenses of one man, including meals, cartage of instruments and travel fare at one cent a mile each way.

The Department has just issued a new pamphlet on "Farm Drainage Operations," which may be had on application.

FELL OVER NIAGARA'S GORGE

And Lives to Tell the Tale.—= A Thrilling Experience.

Hutton, with Harry Allison, a chum also of Toronto, left the Maid of the Mist landing on Saturday for Niagara Falls, where they intended to spend the holiday. The men saw nearly all that was to be seen in the vicinity of the great rapids, and became separated about ten o'clock on the night of the holiday.

HUTTON DISAPPEARS.

After the separation Allison was unable to locate Hutton, that night, and retired with his chum still missing.

The following morning Allison, growing uneasy over his friend's disappearance, started out on a search. Drawing near to the edge of the precipice, he took a look over the bank, and there he saw Hutton close to the water's edge.

He gave the alarm, ropes were secured, but the task of rescue was too difficult to effect by that means. So a small boat was secured at the Maid of the Mist landing.

Hutton was taken aboard and
