He was hurried to the hotel where Dr. Bruce Riordan attended him. His condition was so serious at 7 o'clock Monday night that he was removed to Grace Hospital. His condition is pronounced serious. Meanwhile the bride is on the verge of collapse at the hotel. Mr. McCrea is hotel steward at Shelburne. He is 26 years of age.
