

SODA FOUNTAIN EXPLOSION.

R. J. EAST, SHELBURNE MAN, INJURED WHILE CHARGING SODA FOUNTAIN IS DEAD.

Shelburne, June 4.—Mr. R. J. East, who was injured at 4.30 p.m. yesterday through the explosion of the cylinder of his soda fountain, died at 7.55 p.m., never having regained consciousness.

The boy Anderson, who was also injured, was taken to the General Hospital, Toronto, on this morning's train. His injuries are most serious, one of his arms being so badly broken that amputation may be necessary. It was thought best to send him to the hospital, so that the X-rays might be used on his injured arm.

HOW ACCIDENT HAPPENED.
The accident occurred in a shed at the back of the store, where the cylinder was being charged from the supply tank. When the explosion took place Mr. East was blown out of the door head first, about fifteen feet from where he was standing.

Anderson was blown into a corner on top of some salt barrels. One of Mr. East's children had been with her father, and he evidently was afraid something would happen, as he had just escorted her out of the shed a few minutes before the explosion took place.

Mr. East leaves a wife and three small children, and had only been in possession of the store a couple of weeks, having bought out H. H. Lortie. He originally lived at Damascus, in Luther township.

ANNUAL Excursion to Guelph

An Excursion under the auspices of Centre Grey Farmers' Institute will be run to the Agricultural College, Guelph, on

Thursday, June 25, 1908

Via the Canadian Pacific Railway. Patronize this because:

- (1) The College Farm grows all varieties of Grain, Grasses, Roots and Forage Crops, and the farmers of this country by examining the growing crops should be able to select something for their own farms better than they produce at the present time.
- (2) At the College the principal breeds of live stock—Cattle, Sheep, Swine and Poultry—may be seen under the most favorable conditions.
- (3) The Farm Dairy, the Creamery, the Cheese Factory, the Agricultural Museum, and the lots and flowers may all be inspected and will show to good advantage at this season of the year.
- (4) The new Rural School Building on the College grounds and operated by five school sections will be in running order. The children are brought in vans from five miles around, and the trustees of the five sections form a joint board.
- (5) Macdonald Institute, the school for farmers' daughters, will be open to inspection. Cooking, Sewing and Laundry Work are three principal subjects taught and this year the Institute is filled to its utmost capacity.
