EUPHRASIA LADIES STRUCK BY LIGHTNING.

Mrs. Thos. Nesbitt and Mrs. Wm. Bennett Severely Injured Last Friday.

The thunderstorm on Friday last, which was accompanied by high wind, heavy rainfall and severe lightning, was one of the worst of the season. For one solid hour the wind howled around the street corners, the rain descended in torrents and the vivid flashes of lightning made an exceedingly realistic exhibition of fireworks in the heavens, while between flashes deep, loud crashes of thunder rolled across the sky. For a storm so severe it is remarkable that no damage was done in the village, but in the country it was of a serious character. Mrs. John Bennett, 11th line, Euphrasia, was standing by the stove when a bolt of lightning struck the house and came down the chimney. The fiery fluid came in contact with Mrs. Bennett, who was severely burned from her knees down; to her feet, clothing set fire and partly torn off, and one ankle broken. The other occupants of the house sustained a bad shock, but escaped injury.

Mrs. Thomas Nesbitt, mother of Mr. George Nesbitt, 9th line, was struck by lightning during the same storm and received injuries to her head. Both will recover.

North of Markdale a number of fences were blown down by the high wind, and several outbuildings unroofed.

The storm seemed to be general all over the province. Damage by lightning and several casualties are reported.

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While Friday's storm was a heavy one, it was not equal in severity to that of Monday night and Tuesday. For a couple of hours on Monday night the sky was lit up by incessant lightning of the most dazzling description, and a deluge of rain fell. More damage by lightning, however, was done on Tuesday, when several buildings in the vicinity of Markdale were struck, among them being the following:
