### Something About Sheep.

Sheep crop so closely and so persistently that weeds and bushes have little chance to grow.

### EPPING RESIDENT DEAD.

**MR. THOMAS LONDREY BURSTS BLOOD VESSEL IN HEAD WHILE STOOPING TO TAKE A DRINK.**

Mr. Thomas Londrey, a very highly respected resident of Epping, Euphrasia, died suddenly on Friday of last week, June 19. Deceased, who resided about one mile east of Epping, left his home at 3 p.m. on Friday for the purpose of indulging in a few hours' fishing in the Beaver River. When he failed to return in time for tea, nothing was thought of it, as he was accustomed to drop into some of the neighbors' houses on his way home to have a social chat. As the hours wore on, however, and Mr. Londrey did not return, his wife and youngest son, who lives on the homestead, naturally became anxious and at once began making enquiries of the neighbors, none of whom appeared to have seen the old gentleman. A search party carrying guns, and other implements of alarm was immediately organized with the result that the dead body of Mr. Londrey was found lying face downwards beside the Beaver river. It was thought at first that death must have resulted from heart failure, but as the deceased had never been troubled with weakness of the heart the medical man who was called gave it as his opinion that Mr. Londrey had burst a blood vessel in the head while in the act of stooping down to get a drink.

Deceased who was in his 77th year, was highly respected by all who knew him, and his sudden death cast a gloom over the neighborhood. With the exception of two years that he lived in Meaford, he had been a resident of Euphrasia for about 37 years. In religion he was a member of the Presbyterian church and was also an enthusiastic member of the Orange Order. He is survived by a widow and nine children, five sons and four daughters, all of whom are married and doing for themselves; the youngest son, as already stated, residing with his wife on the homestead.

The funeral took place to Thornbury cemetery and was largely attended.—Mirror.

### COUNCIL NOT RESPONSIBLE

If Broken Planks are not Reported

The action of Mary Louise Cloutier for damages against the town of Euphrasia was dismissed by Judge Britton in the district court at Ottawa on Tuesday morning.

On the 15th of 1907 Mrs. Cloutier was going to her home in Arnprior when she stepped on a broken plank in the sidewalk and fell. She claimed she received personal injuries as the result and asked the town for \$1,500 for negligence in not keeping the sidewalks in repair. The evidence showed that about three weeks previous to the accident a part of coal passed over the sidewalk and the plank was broken, but the broken ends not separated. It remained this way until the accident, according to the evidence no one took the trouble to notify the town council, or ask that it be repaired. The judge held that the corporation was not guilty of negligence because it had not been notified of this broken plank, and only a short time before this break occurred the sidewalks had been fully repaired. He said that corporations ought not to be held to insure the people who use the street, from accident. However, should the plaintiffs carry the case to a higher court, and his decision reversed, he provided that then the damages Mrs. Cloutier should recover from the town was found guilty of negligence, was \$250, thus providing against the necessity of a new trial in such a case. Mr. T. J. Slattery appeared for the plaintiff and Mr. J. E. Thompson for the town.
