The Hospital had last year in its beds and cots 761 patients, 287 of these were from 196 places outside of Toronto.

The cost is 98 cents per patient per day, and there were 129 sick little ones a day in the Hospital.

"GOOD DAY, MOTHER." Since its foundation the Hospital has treated 10,371 children—about 7,600 of these were unable to pay and were treated free.
