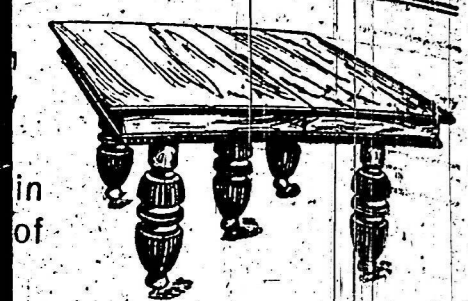

JUNE SESSION

Council met pursuant to adjournment from Wednesday Afternoon Session. The Warden in the chair. Roll called—Members all present. The Minutes of Wednesday Afternoon Session were read, amended, and confirmed as amended.

Moved by Mr. Agnew, seconded by Mr. Day, That leave be granted to introduce a By-law to Equalize the Assessment of the several local municipalities for the purpose of striking a rate to meet the current expenses and liabilities of the County for the year 1909—Carried.

By-law was introduced, read a First time, and numbered 722. Moved by Mr. Agnew, seconded by Mr. McKnight, That leave be granted to introduce a By-law to levy a rate to meet the current expenses and liabilities of the County for the year 1909—Carried. By-law was introduced, read a First time, and numbered 723. By-laws Nos. 722 and 723 were read a Second time accordingly. Moved by Mr. Garvie, seconded by Mr. Legate, That the chairman of Finance be requested to take the necessary steps to borrow money to pay for permanent Bridges, built the present year also, the cost of the building of the Registry office in Durham, and for the additional land bought in connection with the House of Refuge farm, in order to reduce the levy for the present year, as much as possible—Carried.
