Bathing in Baird's pond, etc.
We also desire to express sorrow that so many people have apparently lost all respect for the Sabbath and use it as a day of pleasure parties, visiting, etc., and turn God's day into a day of pleasure. It is because we believe that the saddest physical, moral and spiritual results will flow from such actions, and because we are interested in the true welfare of this community that we thus appeal to the conscience of the people.
