## Owen Sound Wins District.

Owen Sound and Hanover lacrosse teams met on the King Edward Park here on Tuesday to play off their tie for the championship of their district in the Intermediate series of the C.L.A.

Both towns sent large contingents of supporters, the Hanover team and friends to the number of 150 arriving by regular train at noon. The Owen Sound crowd came by special 350 strong, about 3:30. A heavy shower made the grounds wet and slippery but in all other respects the grounds and the day were ideal.

The game had not gone very far when it became evident that either Hanover players were outclassed or they had an off-day. Owen Sound outplayed them in all stages of the game, particularly in the fielding.

In nine minutes of actual play Kelly accepted a pass from Patterson and scored first blood for Owen Sound. This was followed in another minute by Nevings, making it 2 to 0 at end of first quarter.

Hanover woke up in the second quarter and scored, Briggs doing the needful. However, Kelly—our own Joe—scored again for Owen Sound. A stop was called at this junction while Henning, the Hanover goal tender, was patched up. On resuming play Owen Sound kept pressing, and Patterson and Kelly each scored again, making it 4 to 1 at half time.

The third quarter was rough, seven players decorating the penalty bench. Although the Owen Sound fielders—especially Chesney—played hard, no goals were scored, though Hanover had a close call when Kelly hit the goal post.

At the commencement of the last quarter, Hanover gave promise of doing better, Briggs scoring in a minute. But their spurt was short lived, as Owen Sound scored twice more, making the final score Owen Sound 6, Hanover 2.

The game as a whole was a fair exhibition of lacrosse and was fairly clean. Referee Madill, of Shelburne, keeping the players well in hand. For Hanover, Henning in goal, H. Wendorf and Briggs did the best work, while Chesney, Armstrong, Patterson, Kelly and Nevings starred for the Sounders. Joe Kelly appearing to be the most aggressive player on the field.

The gate was a good one, while the Park Committee, as a result of the Grand Stand, will have a few dollars to spend on the grounds.

The Hanover Band, under the leadership of Mr. R. T. Heintz, accompanied the contingent from that town and played some lively airs on the street before the game and also on the grounds. Hanover has a splendid band, and their music was highly appreciated.

## SPOILED THE BALL GAME

How Farmer Forced Sunday Players to Leave His Field.—Released a Wild Bull.

New York, Aug. 17.—A game of baseball between the Clinton Athletics and the Jacksonville Pioneers was broken up at Jacksonville, N. J., yesterday by a bull belonging to William Haupt. Haupt protested against the game being played on the Sabbath. The ball players refused to evacuate his field, and when he attempted to enforce the order they threatened him. Haupt then released the bull. The Athletics wore red shirts and stockings, and when the bull saw those he made a fierce charge. Players and spectators fled terror-stricken.

All got out of the way except Michael Boland, catcher of the Athletics, who was tossed over a fence but sustained only a few scratches. Farmer Haupt says he will repeat the performance if any more Sunday baseball is attempted.
