The subjects of Part I examination are: Art, History, Literature, Nature Study, and Physiology and Hygiene. Those of Part II of Entrance being Reading (oral), Spelling, Writing, Arithmetic, Composition, Grammar, Geography, and Written Reading. While the marks of the pupils are not published, any parent desiring to do so.
