

EXPLOSION SHAKES CITY OF BRANTFORD

Babe Killed, Many Injured—One More Has Since Died—Natural Gas Explosion Shatters a Whole Block.

Brantford, Sept. 12.—At two o'clock yesterday afternoon a rending explosion and quake-like shock lifted up and hurled over into Colborne street, a row of five shop buildings, crushing a mother and baby so that the infant died, burying a number of people, one or more of whom cannot recover, and creating a panic for the time being. The upheaval and shattering without the slightest premonitory warning, of what a moment before was a solid block, caused people on the streets to rush for shelter while those within the wrecked debris fought their way to the thoroughfare. Horses ran away, street wires snapped and fell, and the greatest excitement prevailed before firemen, police and ambulance corps summoned to the work of relief, got to the scene. The property damage is \$50,000.

AN EXPLOSION OF GAS. While the theory is that the explosion was caused by the ignition of natural gas incident to work being done on the mains, this has not been fully established as the real cause so far.

The shock occurred along the south side of Colborne street, just west of King street in the heart of the wholesale district, and although the terror-stricken crowds in the vicinity looked to see the catastrophe heightened by tongues of flame shooting from the still trembling debris on the street, only one small fire started and was quickly extinguished.

A person glancing up at the row of stores would have seen them in their accustomed solidity. Next moment there was the blast of an explosion, and then five buildings, one of four storeys, one of three, and the others two storeys, seemed to rise a trifle, then swayed outward and then collapsed across the street, sending tons of brick and stone, beams and mortar, hurtling to the street with a crash.

HOUSES SPLIT IN TWO. The first shock was followed by two immediately after, and besides the cave-in of the shops, three dwelling houses on the same side of the street were rent and split in two, one section toppling into the thoroughfare and the rest falling away down the canal embankment at the rear.

DURHAM'S LOCAL OPTION.

The Review says:—Almost everybody had come to the conclusion that we were to have local option in Durham for three years unquestioned when last May's decision was given, especially when the time for appeal expired last June. It appears that through a mistake of Mr. Wright's, the hotelkeepers' solicitor, the decision was then allowed to go unappealed and now they are applying for an order permitting them to appeal the case at the High Court. Whether or not the order will be granted will be decided at the next Court on Sept. 15. In the meantime Mr. J. H. Brown, on behalf of the council, went to Mr. Forest to-day (Wednesday) to post the town's solicitor, Mr. Kingston, concerning the facts of the case.

At an early hour Sunday a G.T.R. detective, with the assistance of the Toronto police force, arrested Allan Stanley and Michael McHugh who are charged with entering a bonded car and stealing a quantity of merchandise. The accused are employed by the railway.

HINTS FOR HOME-MAKERS.

Don't crack nuts with your teeth. Use spiced crabapples as a relish for roast duck. Lime put into the stove with coal will help to prevent cinders. A small onion put into broth or bouillon will clear it like magic. Take your discarded shirtwaists to make gimpes for the little one. Old fleece lined shirts make good covers or pads for the iron board. Vinegar will clean mica in stove doors so they look as transparent as new.

AN HOUR IN THE AIR.

Light Aeroplane Breaks its Past Record at Good Speed.

Washington, Sept. 11.—With his heavier-than-air machine, Orville Wright made a trip through the air to-day which lasted one hour, ten minutes and twenty-six seconds. This is the greatest exploit to date of the promising aeronaut.

He made two flights from Fort Myer, Va., to-day, the other being only for ten minutes and fifty seconds, to show the speed of the aeroplane. The test showed a speed of 39.57 miles an hour.

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
