Charles Littlejohns Dead.

Mr. Charles Littlejohns, of the suburbs, pioneer of this district passed out of this life on Tuesday, September 29, 1908, aged 85 years, two years and one day after the decease of his wife. The old gentleman has been of late years feeble both in mind and body, so much so that he did not fully realize his recent severe affliction, the death of his faithful partner in life as above, and of his two sons, George, the 5th May last, and C. W. the 25th of the same month. Deceased was born in England, came to Canada when but a lad, resided for some years in Leeds County, and, some 45 years ago came to this part and has since, up to his death, resided on the farm then purchased from the late Edward Rutledge, whereby industry and frugality he hewed out of the forest for himself and family a comfortable and prosperous home. The following members of the family survive: William of Markdale; Thomas S. Montauk; Mrs. Will Varty, Innisfail, Alta.; Mrs. James Foster, Mrs. J. H. Lever; Mrs. John Varty, and Mrs. W. G. Cockburn, hereabout, and Edwin at home. Interment took place this Wednesday to Markdale public cemetery. Rev. J. S. I. Wilson officiated at the house and the grave. The pall-bearers were Messrs. J. B. Tibbald, Angus Plewes, R. W. Ennis, J. W. Hamilton, J. W. and C. W. Rutledge. Truly the remaining pioneers are becoming few in number.

Mr. and Mrs. Francis Eaton, of Meaford, celebrated their diamond wedding on Saturday last, having been married for sixty years.

Relatives from far and near gathered to participate in the happy event. The event was unusual, not only for the fact that the bride and groom have been married so long, but for the fact that the bridegroom has a son who has reached the top ring of the ladder of successful sons who have graduated from the cities. Among them is Sydney Eaton, author of the original *Teddy Bear*.

Mr. Francis Eaton and Mrs. Frances Ann Ball, son and daughter of Ephrasia's first settlers, were married on September 18, 1848. They are now in their eighty-second years and for many years have been residents of the town, widely known and respected and much beloved.

Mr. and Mrs. Eaton were born in Ireland, and were married in St. Vincent. They took up their residence in the town of Ephrasia, where by incessant toil they reared a family, of which the aged couple are now proud parents.
