Old white wash skirts can be made into pretty baby coats.

Fresh haddock should be cooked from eight to fifteen minutes.

Blocks of pumice-stone serve admirably piled over the burners in a gas-fire.

Have a small pair of saw horses made on which to set trunks while packing.

To cure hives, wet the affected part with salt and water, then apply dry sulphur.

Give children a spoonful of sweet cream immediately after a dose of bitter medicine.

To keep wooden bread boards in good condition, scrub them with sand or salt instead of soap.

For starching muslins, ginghams and calicoes, dissolve one teaspoonful of alum to one quart of water.

Before broiling always throw a little salt on the coals to prevent a blaze from the dripping fat.

Cold sliced potatoes, fry and taste better if a teaspoonful of flour is sprinkled over them while frying.

Wash lettuce carefully; drain in colander and place on ice. This will make it crisp when ready to serve.

To keep veils in good condition, get a small rolling pin and wind them round this as smoothly as possible.

Never throw away your potato peelings, but always burn them and you will seldom have to clean your stove.

Hot alum water is the best insect destroyer known. Put the alum into hot water and let boil until dissolved.

Pickles should never be kept in glazed wire, as the vinegar forms a poisonous compound with the glazing.

Stained lobby tiles should have a little spirit of salt put on with a clean rag, then be well washed with clean cold water.

NEWS NOTES.

The density of the smoke on Thursday evening last prevented the Shelburne band from giving their weekly concert on the street.

Mr. Robert Mann's fine residence in Orangeville has been purchased by the congregation of St. Andrew's Church for a manse for their minister.

James Keating, of Melancthon, lost a good six-year-old horse a couple of weeks ago. The animal fell head first into a well twelve feet deep, breaking its neck.

Blanche, the little daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Richard Backus, of the Royal Hotel, Shelburne, fell over the tongue of a rig in the hotel yard the other day and had her arm broken.

The Pine River Power Company is developing the Huxtable water power near Horning Mills with a view to furnishing electric light and power for Shelburne, Orangeville and Grand Valley.

Samuel Lackey, of Orangeville, formerly of Shelburne, who has been for the past couple of years in charge of a large number of laborers engaged in C. P. R. construction work on this line, is going on a trip to the Pacific coast with his daughter Maggie.
