MARKDALE EXHIBITION A COMPLETE SUCCESS.

The six weeks dry spell had ended, and the equinoctial gales being over due fully a week seemed to be putting on a special sprint to make up time just when Markdale Exhibition began. The afternoon of the second day, however, brightened beautifully and the attendance proved fairly good, though not up to some former years, the gate receipts being \$100 short of high water mark. The hall exhibit was large and tastefully arranged. The Marsh Hall was used for this purpose, and its spacious interior and convenient location were commendably referred to. This was by all odds, the finest exhibit in many years if not in the history of the Society. Ladies' Work was in abundance and of superior quality, canned fruit and cookery temptingly displayed and generously sampled by the judges. Fine Arts took a prominent place and conspicuous position, fruits, roots, vegetables and cereals more humble but none the less admired, house plants beautifully adorned the centre of the building while Wilson's exhibit of musical instruments presented an attractive effect on the stage. The grounds were in excellent condition and the exhibit of stock indeed commendable, though some good herds from Euphrasia were not on hand owing to the dark, showery and threatening aspect of the elements Friday morning. The large exhibit of superior horses was the admiration of all lovers of that noble animal. On the whole the exhibition was in advance of that of any former year. A feature of the second day was the school children's parade under the direction of Principal Rowe and headed by the Citizens Band. The march from the public school to King Edward Park by several hundreds of school children waving scores of Union Jacks was a pleasing feature. The Band discoursed excellent music during the afternoon from their position on the grand stand. The dog races and horse speeding caused considerable excitement as such always does. The Directors are much encouraged by the success of the exhibition and are determined to make next year's Fair still better.

THE CONCERT.

The Fair management have the reputation of furnishing a good concert, and their effort this year has proven an improvement even on that of former years. The attendance was large, the hall being packed. Mr. J. B. Lucas, M.L.A., opened the program with a short but appropriate address, in which he highly complimented the Directors on the growing success and popularity of the Fall Fair.
