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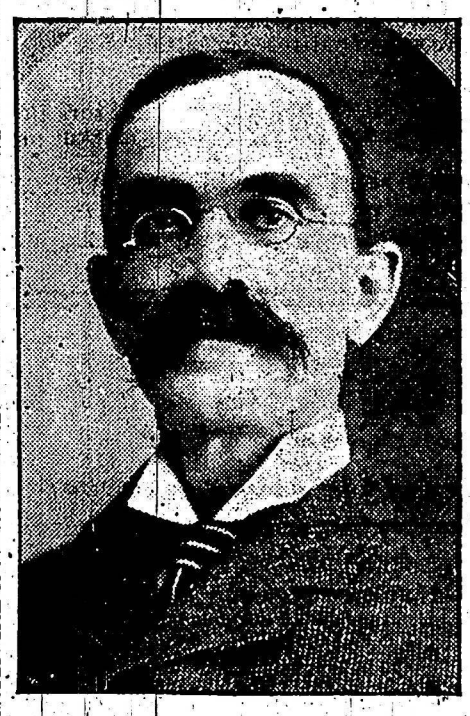

GRAND JURY PRESENTMENT

Recommend More Help at House of Refuge—Inmates There Who Should Not Be Sent to This Institution.

Although the County Council in its wisdom only provides for the expenses of one Grand Jury inspection of the House of Refuge for each year, the Grand Jury at the Assizes last week visited the institution and presented the following important report of their inspection.

To His Lordship, the Hon. Mr. Justice Riddell:

With your Lordship's permission the Grand Jury beg leave to present their report.

We appreciate the honor conferred on us in being chosen to assist your Lordship in maintaining and upholding the laws of our beloved country in this County of Grey and we wish here to express our thanks to your Lordship for the very clear and concise address to us in defining our duties and privileges while attending to the business which devolved on us. Also to express our admiration of the manner in which the Court has been conducted, with fairness, dignity and punctuality.

We visited the gaol and report everything there clean and tidy throughout the building. The inmates have warm and comfortable quarters, but outside of the work entailed on the premises in keeping the building clean, cooking and laundry work, there is no provision made to employ the prisoners. We believe some work should be provided. Should a fire occur in the gaol there would be great danger of the prisoners losing their lives and we think fire escapes should be provided in such a way that would be of benefit at the time of fire and that could not be used by prisoners as an escape at ordinary times. We found the following prisoners—5 for breach of the Liquor License Act; 1 for carnal knowledge; 1 for keeper of house of ill-fame; 4 for vagrancy; 1 for murder; 2 for insane; 1 for theft; 1 for breach of the House of Refuge By-law; 1 for drunk and disorderly; 1 for obtaining goods under false pretences. In all, 18 prisoners, all males.

THE COURT HOUSE.

We would recommend some improvements in the comfort of the Jury rooms, particularly for the petty jury in which the jury are detained for days and nights in succession. Some attention should be given to the ventilation of the Court Room. Another petty jury room should be provided.

HOSPITAL.

We visited the General and Marine Hospital and cannot speak in too high terms of the admirable state of things there. We were shown through by the courteous Matron, and everything denoted that the aim and object there was to provide a place to give relief and cheer to those who are so unfortunate as to require the care that such an institution provides. There are 18 patients which are looked after by a very tidy and efficient staff of 19 nurses and the matron. We would recommend the extension of the present nearby foot walk to the front steps of the building.

HOUSE OF REFUGE.

We went to Markdale by train and inspected the County House of Refuge there. The manager, Mr. Harbess, met us at the door and it being comparatively early in the morning we had a chance to see things without being specially put in order for our visit. In the kitchen we found the ventilation very defective, so much so that the odors from the cooking of meat and vegetables find their way up through the various storeys above; some means should be provided to

In the dining rooms the ventilation is gained by raising the windows on which there are no screens, consequently the flies have free access, and they were on the tables and eatables in abundance. A room adjoining the men's dining room, in which the males smoke, and which we were told that they occupy this room about two-thirds of the day time, very poor accommodation is provided. Benches similar to what people used in the early days in the first shanties in the new country, are provided; no backs on them, and the inmates lean against the rough unplastered walls, which give out a very cold comfort. The walls should be lathed and plastered. We found the day rooms clean and well ventilated. The sleeping rooms were all that could be desired for an institution of the kind, also lavatories are provided on each floor and for each sex four baths are provided. The halls are lighted by lamps throughout the night. We believe the manager, his wife and two girl assistants are not a sufficient staff to give the care and attention to the inmates. We believe, and would strongly recommend that a strong woman of a kindly disposition, with some knowledge of nursing and endowed with a good share of common sense, should be employed for one purpose and for one purpose only, that is, to look after and give her attention to those inmates who fall sick and are unable to take care of themselves or get a drink when they are thirsty. An inmate, a paralytic, one Henderson, we think an inmate for the House of Incurables, rather than a House of Refuge. This man we found lying on a small couch too short by 12 to 15 inches to accommodate the length of his body, consequently his feet extended beyond the couch by the above distance without any support. He appeared unable to move, and the manager informed us that he had no control of his physical nature. He was located in the male day room where the male inmates are supposed to sit and read, etc. From information gathered we believe this man had been in that place for days without being in bed.

While we do not wish to cast any reflection on the manager and his wife we firmly believe, as we have previously stated, that they with their assistants have too many duties to perform to give the attention to such cases as our human nature would dictate to us. The care of such patients has to be left to some of the inmates who appear to have about all they can do to take care of themselves.

Our railway fares, amounting to \$15.60 we have been informed that the County Treasurer refuses to pay because the County Council have made provision for only one visit of the Grand Jury per year. All of which is respectfully submitted.

Tilson vs. Young—For injuries sustained in saw mill was adjourned till next court.

McEachern vs. G.T.R.—Consent judgment for plaintiff for \$200 for death of her husband near Thornbury.

Goldsmith vs. G.T.R.—Was a similar case to the one preceding and was settled by consent judgment for plaintiff for \$50.

Riggs vs. London Mutual—Action dismissed with costs.

Wright vs. C.P.R.—Action arising out of the Caledon wreck. Judgment by consent for plaintiff for \$200.

Jackson vs. Hull—Judgment for plaintiff for \$50.

Crawford vs. Spence & Denholme—Consent judgment for plaintiff for \$150.

Bellamy vs. C.P.R.—Another case arising out of Caledon wreck. Consent judgment for plaintiff for \$200.

Richardson vs. Kuechtel—Consent judgment for plaintiff for \$275.

Sharp vs. Best—An action for seduction. Judgment for plaintiff for \$100.

Henson vs. Pinch—Was adjourned until next court.

King vs. King et al and King vs. King.—In these two cases consent judgment on the terms that the defendants pay the plaintiff \$100 costs, withdraw the alleged statements complained of and undertake in the future not to make similar statements.

Stones vs. C.P.R.—Action for damages in wreck at Owen Sound, caused by a runaway engine. Consent judgment for plaintiff for \$500 and costs and hospital and medical attendance and re-employment in the company's service.

Keenan vs. Tackaberry—Adjourned till next court.

Jackson vs. Dinsmore—Action dismissed with costs.

The non jury cases were all adjourned until next court, except that of Mason vs. Owen Sound. Judgment for the plaintiff was given for \$700 and costs.
