

Shocking Accident on C.P.R. Near Stickney, N.B.—Two Freight Trains Collide.

Woodstock, N.B., Oct. 18.—During a dense fog yesterday two C. P. R. freight trains collided head-on near Stickney. Robert Johnson, St. John, fireman, was burned to death, and Chas. Humphrey, Woodstock, was fatally injured and died a short time after.

Fireman Johnson was caught between the tender and the firebox, and roasted alive, while he pitifully begged the trainmen to kill him and put him out of his agony. One leg was burned off before he was extricated. Humphrey had both legs and his back broken: Conductor Taylor was injured about the head and face. The engineer and fireman on the other train jumped and saved their lives.
