MILLER'S MAJORITY IS 87.

Below we give the detailed state of the vote in South Grey on polling day, Oct. 26, when Mr. H. H. Miller carried the riding by a majority of 87 over Mr. Ball. The total number of votes polled was 4447, which was an increase of 300 votes over that of four years ago. Miller's majority in 1904 was 316, and this has been decreased by 229 in 1908. The surprises in the contest were—the large majority in Glenelg, a Conservative majority in Egremont, and the small adverse Durham vote. Dr. Jamieson had a majority of 200 in Durham in the Provincial election.
