MILLER'S MAJORITY IS 87.

Below we give the detailed statement of the vote in South Grey on polling day, Oct. 26, when Mr. H. H. Miller carried the riding by a majority of 87 over Mr. Ball. The total number of votes polled was 4447, which was an increase of 309 votes over that of four years ago. Miller's majority in 1904 was 316, and this has been decreased by 229 in 1908. The surprises in the contest were—the large majority in Glenelg, a Conservative majority in Egremont, and the small adverse Durham vote. Dr. Jamieson had a majority of 209 in Durham in the Provincial election.

HOUSEHOLD HINTS.

Which is better than mind of the silly derangement. They must be eaten very fresh. They should be cooked. Dissolved butter is a very good substitute for olive oil in salad dressing. Prefer the butter to the milk. Making loops for dresses is made over a small lead pencil. Good cooling powder for the face is composed of four parts of talc and one part of starch. Onions are a liver stimulant and are in indigestion of a general state of the system. They possess the property of purifying the blood. Cooked meat should be served in a dish in the paper. Wash your dishes. Wrap your dishes in grease-proof paper and keep them away. Mending gloves, it is a very easy matter to darn the ends with a small marble. Tighten wringing on wheels on each side of the tub of water before using the ring, and it will work as fast as had been giled. For general sewing use an ironed needle No. 9. They are better and not so thick as the ordinary needle, and then wash the head.
