## The laws of Ontario regarding stray cattle are definite. In cases where cattle are at large and wander onto the premises of one who is not their owner there are two courses to pursue. As soon as the animal is discovered on the man's premises, he may drive it to the pound and notify the clerk of the municipality, who will attend to its release or indisposition or he may secure it on his premises and retain it while he is complying with statutory requirements for its disposition, which are these: He must first publish a notice of the presence of such beast on his property, in a newspaper published in his locality, for three consecutive weeks. If the owner fails to claim the animal, its custodian must keep it for two months, and if its value exceeds \$20 it must be sold, and after all expenses of harboring and sale, which must not exceed \$20, have been deducted, the balance must be handed to the treasurer of the municipality, in case the lawful owner of the animal has not in the meantime been found. If the value of the animal is below \$20, it becomes the property of the man on whose premises it has strayed, after he had properly advertised its presence. When an animal is claimed, and expenses of pasture or feeding are determined, the law makes provision against exorbitant charges. Any person harboring animals which are not his own, and does not advertise their presence, is liable to prosecution, when a heavy fine may be imposed by a justice of the peace.
