MUST HAVE PROHIBITION.

Presbyterian General Assembly Stand Toward the Liquor Traffic—Pamphlet Circulated Settling Forth Attitude of the Church.

A pamphlet entitled "Policy on Temperance Reform," outlining the standing of the Presbyterian Church in Canada on the Temperance question has been received by The Standard. The following resolution by the General Assembly at Winnipeg this year is quoted: "The Assembly would reaffirm the deliverance of former Assemblies that nothing short of the prohibition of the traffic in intoxicants for beverage purposes can satisfy as the goal in temperance reform, and would recommend our people in those Provinces where there is no immediate prospect of carrying and enforcing prohibition to unite with others in working toward this end, by: (a) The curtailment of the traffic by local veto; (b) the abolition of the barroom and the public treating system associated therewith; and (c) the prohibition of the residue of the traffic, with this proviso, that where in cities or towns the said sale is demanded by a majority of the qualified municipal electors, such sale shall be conducted under such conditions as will eliminate the element of private gain." The pamphlet then enters into a discussion of the many reasons for this attitude.

ABOUT THE FARM.

Ontario is going to be short of rough feeds and grain for feeding purposes this winter. Every farmer who has roughage to save should do it well, as every stalk will be needed this winter. The feeding of cattle, hogs and sheep is a question that is being weighed by many farmers. Will it pay to feed cattle this winter? Many venture the opinion that it will pay handsomely in the spring. And it looks good. In the western states corn is holding very high, and farmers are inclined to sell stock and save for corn prices. This would look like a good thing for beef next spring when the demand will likely be strong. Ontario farmers being short of feed, will likely retrench somewhat in their feeding operations, all of which will make it better for the man who stays in. But the anomalies of the cattle business are so great that what one expects, quite often is upset by many people looking for and preparing for the same thing. Discounting all this, the price for Ontario beef will likely be as remunerative as at any time during the coming season. Less beef will be made east of the Mississippi River during the next six months than at any time since cattle feeding became an industry, says a writer in the Gazette. In the territory east of the Missouri there will be a heavy decrease in production. What Kansas, Nebraska, Oklahoma and South Dakota will accomplish remains to be seen, but few in the trade believe last year's crop will be equalled. Beef eaters of the United States are justified in feeling concern over the prospect.

BUY PURE BREEDS.

A great many sales of pure-bred cattle are being held in the United States, and the one noticeable thing is the lowness of prices. The same dullness prevails on this side. And just here is the very thing that business farmers are realizing as their chance. The man who sees pure bred Shorthorns selling low, buys and in a very short time turns them over to make good money. And the good price for Shorthorns will soon come with a rush; and he who has them shall be a happy man. It is good advice that the Breeders' Gazette gives, when it says to lay in a stock of a few good breeding cattle.

THE HOG SITUATION.

The same conditions prevail this fall as did last year, to make spring pork an extra good price. Very light hogs are being marketed in the several Mississippi River markets, which means selling their corn. Ontario has no feed to throw away, and farmers are in no panic to store pens full of hogs. Moreover, there is not the amount of porcine youngsters in the field as in some seasons. Any man who can run hogs through the winter will find a good market, but it will take courage to do this where the root crops have failed, although the corn yield is excellent.

MUTTON AND LAMBS.

If Ontario men made money last season feeding lambs, it looks a far more optimistic season this year for duplicating the practice. Lambs are cheaper and the United States situation is such that the demand is likely to over-top the supply early in 1909.

FRACTURED COLLAR BONE.

Peter McBride, of Jessopville, was drawing pressed hay on Saturday afternoon and when getting up on the load the horses made a sudden start and he fell heavily to the ground, fracturing his collar bone. Dr. White attended to the fracture.—Shelburne Economist.
