NOVEMBER SESSION OF COUNTY COUNCIL.

Charges Against the House of Refuge Will Be Investigated.

The November session of the County Council of Grey was opened at the court house, Owen Sound, Monday evening with all the members in attendance except Messrs. Johnstone, of Keppel, and Wilson, of Bentinck. The Warden of the County, Mr. R. J. Ball, of Harbour, presided, and in his opening remarks made reference to recent charges made against the management of the House of Refuge, at Markdale, which he stated would form a matter for the consideration of the council during the session. As the warden was mover of a resolution exonerating the manager and by inference charging the grand jury which made the presentment containing charges against House of Refuge management when the subject was under consideration a year ago, he doubtless feels that in justice to the matter a full investigation is now called for.

The usual large budget of accounts and communications were presented by Clerk Rutherford and referred to committees.

Another important matter before the council at this session will be the petition of ratepayers in the northeast part of Owen Sound to be withdrawn from the corporation and annexed to Sydenham, following the example of those who succeeded several years ago.

Port Law's New School.

An excellent report of the opening of this new building is given in the Flesherton correspondence. The school is built with basement, seven foot ceiling and cement floors. The class room is 28x33 feet with two cloak rooms 6x12 feet, also a teachers room 11x12 feet. The class room is bright and cheerful with plenty of light coming from the rear and left of pupils and is furnished with 60 individual seats and heated by furnace. Also 170 square feet of blackboard. The walls are white plastered, with art metallic ceiling wainscoted with first class maple finished in natural color. All inside floors are grained; all outside doors and windows set on stone sills.

A meeting of the Markdale hockey enthusiasts was held in the Markdale House on Tuesday, Nov. 17. It was decided to organize a hockey club and place the same in the Intermediate O.H.A.

GIVE RIGHT CHARACTER TO SERVANTS.

There is nothing more keenly appreciated by good servants than evenness of temper, which respects itself at the time it respects others. A lady visited a dying servant not long ago, who had been in her family for 33 years. "Now are you, Nancy?" she asked, taking hold of the withered hand which was held out. "Is that you, my darling pet?" exclaimed the old woman, as a beam of joy spread over her face. "Oh, yes," she added, looking up, "it is you, my kind, my mannerly mistress."

A wise mistress sees that their meals are regularly served and that they are undisturbed during that time.
